

JASON MOORE IS COMING IN MAY

SO SAYS HIS PORTLAND ATTORNEY

Chester A. Sheppard Says Promoter is Prepared to Begin Work on Salt Lakes Enterprise at Once—\$4,000,000 is To Be Available.

(Oregon Journal.)

Jason C. Moore, to whom the State has leased the salt impregnated lakes, Summer and Albert in Lake county, will return to Portland from New York between the first and fifteenth of May. His attorney says he is prepared to begin development work on the huge enterprise which it is estimated will result in an ultimate investment of between \$6,000,000 and \$7,000,000, if the plans do not miscarry. When he reaches Portland it is announced that not less than \$4,000,000 will be available to begin the construction of the plant necessary to extract the various valuable salts now held in solution in the lakes.

This information was given out today by Chester A. Sheppard, attorney for Moore and is based on communications just received by Sheppard from Moore who has been in New York since March.

The names of the persons or corporations backing Moore are still kept in the dark but Sheppard declared today he was satisfied that Moore has the money he claims to have, and will go through with the huge deal which calls for the erection of a big plant on the Columbia river near the mouth of the Deschutes and the construction of a 200 mile cross state pipe line to carry the fluid from the lakes to the manufacturing site.

Under the provision of the leasing bill passed by the legislature and signed by the governor, Moore has until August to start actual construction work. Moore has already put in approximately in \$100,000 in preliminary work and on May 22 will be required to pay the state \$15,000, the balance due on the initial payment of \$25,000 guaranteed Oregon annually for the lease.

The first construction probably will be at the lakes themselves where it is proposed to erect a small salt isolating plant for experimental and commercial operations pending the installation of the pipe line and the erection of permanent plant buildings on the Columbia river site.

WILKES SAYS WE ARE CHEERFUL

PROSPECTS OF DEVELOPMENT PLEASE

Railroad Man, Here Last Week, Says More Wheat Has Been Planted Here Than Last Year—Industries Mean Much to Bend.

(Oregon Journal.)

Twenty per cent more wheat has been planted in the Central Oregon country south of the Crooked river, and 10 per cent more north of the river than last year, according to W. C. Wilkes, assistant general freight and passenger agent of the Oregon Trunk, who returned today from a trip to the "banana belt."

"Bend people," said Mr. Wilkes, "are feeling cheerful over prospects of the new Shevlin mill and the developments at the soda lakes by Jason C. Moore. The impression is in that city that both these industries will mean much to Bend. Ample rainfall and warm weather now have put new confidence into the farmers. "As a matter of fact, the falling off in railroad earnings on our Central Oregon line is much smaller than on any other line. That may sound odd, but considering the comparatively small volume originating there at any time, the general decrease is being felt there least."

"Bend people believe that the Moore syndicate will build its precipitating plant right at the shores of Summer and Albert lakes. Transportation to Bend is expected to be by motor truck for the present. Talk of the proposed line has been heard but little of late."
