THE FUTURE.

The word for which Bend has waited so long has come. An immense modern saw mill is to be built here. Work is to begin at once and the mill will be sawing lumber by November, the month of Thanksgiving.

The announcement brings jubilation to every resident of the city, pleasure to its friends, satisfaction to its investors. To those among the number who have publicly stated their belief in the future of the city, and, by the jealous and short sighted, have been derided therefor, the news is especially grateful.

Now is justified the city's expenditures for a costly sewer, for good streets, and private investments in modern business buildings and handsome residences. All that for which we have been called foolish now proves that we were wise.

The mill which has been announced and the one whose announcement is expected will cause the population of Bend to double and quadruple in the next few years. Other industries will be attracted here. An impetus toward the construction of railroads which will center here may be looked for.

To the city as a whole all this will bring much more than gratification at seeing Bend grow. Many responsibilities will be added. The necessity for the extension of the sewer will come. Undoubtedly, we shall be obliged to go for a water supply further up the river. New schools will be needed. A city park system should be planned.

With the gratification let us accept the responsibilities. Let us begin now to make plans. Belief in the future to which we today so closely approach has brought Bend to its present development. The same belief looks forward now to even greater development. Shall we not by our works give evidence of our faith?

Beyond its local aspect and effect our coming growth adds immeasurably to our political place in Crook county. Hitherto, it is safe to say, recognition in county affairs has come to us, not because of, but in spite of, our accepted position. Jealousy has led to alliances against us which, even with the assistance of our steadfast friends, we have been able to overcome. The "balance of power" now in one place and now in another, has never been turned in our favor, and we remember.

Soon, however, probably by the time of the next election, there will be no question of the "balance of power." The only thing to be considered will be the power, and that will be Bend's. Just what political changes will follow, it is perhaps too soon to discuss. That there will be changes is certain and we may well now begin to be thinking about them.

The mill is coming. That is the great present fact. The future to which we have turned our thoughts and our hopes we shall be living in tomorrow. Let us now plan and look forward to another and at the same time let us not forget to give our thanks to the man whose planning and the men whose confidence brings us where we are.

ENOUGH EXPLOITATION.
Discussing the work that lies before Portland's new Chamber of Commerce the Telegram says: "The period of exploitation has passed, never to return."
That, in a great measure, is true of all the west. Henceforward we need subjective up-building, not objective advertising. It will, in fact, take some years of diligent endeavor to develop ourselves into what we have declared ourselves to be. We need trouble no further to win recognition or attract immigration, except as secondary considerations. Our problem now is to build soundly from the bottom up, increasing the production of our acres, the markets for our products and the payrolls of our employed so that those who have come already may prosper.
