SURVEY IS COMPLETED. The survey for the Silver Lake irrigation project has just been completed by W. E. Parkhill and a force of assistant engineers in the employ of the federal reclamation service. If the report of the engineers is favorable as predicted by persons who have made preliminary investigation of the project, the Silver Lake Water Users' Association will proceed at once with plans for bonding the district and irrigating more than 100,000 acres of sage brush land. This project has been hanging fire for a dozen years. The recent leasing of Lake county's mineral lakes has revived irrigation enthusiasm.

Commercial Body Bears Discussion of Road Subscription Matter.

MORE AGRICULTURISTS COME

Party of Hill Line Officials To Tour Central Oregon in June.

A party of immigration and agricultural officials from the Hill lines will tour Central Oregon during the first two weeks in June holding meetings at various points and meeting as many farmers as possible. The Bend meeting will be on the evening of June 2, in the Commercial Club room.

According to announcements by J. T. Hardy of the Oregon Trunk, the party will be made up as follows:

Prof. Thomas Shaw, agriculturist, Great Northern Ry.; Prof. E. A. Wilson, agriculturist, Northern Pacific Ry.; F. W. Graham, western immigration agent, Great Northern Ry.; C. E. Arney, immigration agent, Northern Pacific Ry.; and two of the best instructors from the O. A. C., including A. E. Lovatt, now located in Central Oregon. Professor Shaw will speak on diversified farming, dry farming and livestock.

HUDSON AN OREGON DELEGATE.

SALEM, May 18.—Governor Withycombe has announced that the conference of western states called to discuss water power and other questions of public importance will meet in Portland September 21, 22, 23, C. S. Hudson of Bend, is one of the five Oregon delegates. The others are the Governor, Senators Huston and Thompson and Edgar B. Piper, editor of the Oregonian. It is expected that half a dozen governors and many of the west's most important personages will attend the conference.

COUNCIL HAS APPLICATIONS.

The chief business to come before the council at its meeting last night was the Oregon Trunk spur franchise for the new Shelvin saw mill, as reported elsewhere in this paper. Other matters presented and referred to committees were an application from Louis Dooner for license to operate a moving picture house and from the Bend band for a contribution from the city.

COLLEGE ISSUES PAMPHLET.

To assist in the observance of a law passed by the last legislature requiring that a license be secured by all users of the Babcock test for determining butter fat and for other purposes connected with the dairy business the Oregon Agricultural College has just issued a pamphlet on the subject. The pamphlet is college bulletin No. 201, and may be had on application to the college.

COUNTY COURT NOTES

In anticipation of the settlement between Crook and Jefferson counties provided by the county division law the courts of the two counties have arranged for the employment of Max Crandall to audit the records of Crook county. The expense of the audit will be borne jointly by Crook and Jefferson county on a basis of two thirds and one third respectively.

The county court house has been insured in the sum of \$50,000.

Sheriff Knox will qualify at once as tax collector, the law passed by the last legislature taking these duties away from the county treasurer.

The county court has agreed to contribute \$75 to Tillman Reuter for the purpose of placing an agricultural exhibit at the San Francisco fair, on condition that Jefferson county contribute the same amount.

Arrangements are being made to provide an office in the court house for Circuit Judge Duffy.

The county court has appropriated \$200 each for the Redmond Potato show and the Sisters fair.

Henry Clow has been appointed janitor of the court house.

The road districts of the county have been rebounded by the county court to care for the changes made by the separation of Jefferson county.

PIONEER COMPANY EXTENDS.

The Pioneer Telephone Company has announced that construction of a double metallic telephone from Madras to Culver via Metolius will soon be undertaken. Poles for the line are now being delivered and when the line is completed Jefferson county will enjoy much better service.

RESOLUTIONS ARE PASSED

Tumalo Assessment Club Wants Farm Land Methods Changed.

The following resolutions in respect to the assessment of farm lands were passed by the Tumalo Improvement Club at its meeting on Saturday, May 8.

"Whereas, it has been the custom of the County Assessor to place the valuation on farm lands at various rates and to distinguish between the various kinds of crops grown on the said farm lands, and

"Whereas, it is deemed to be unfair and unjust to place a valuation of from \$70 to \$25 per acre on lands seeded to alfalfa and clover and at the same time to place a valuation of from \$15 to \$18 per acre on similar lands on which are grown wheat, oats, potatoes and other crops, and

"Whereas, we believe it not right to punish the farmer because he chooses to grow a certain kind of crops on his land,

"Therefore Be It Resolved, That the Tumalo Improvement Club, in regular session assembled, respectfully demand that the rate of taxation be placed on a uniform basis for farm lands under like conditions and of the same quality and condition of soil and thereby eliminate the present custom of punishment to the farmer who desires to raise certain kinds of crops on his lands;

"Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be handed the County Assessor, a copy sent the County Board of Equalization and that a copy be sent The Bend Bulletin for publication.

Light & Power Co. has been filed with the commission with the consent of the attorney for the city.

The stock of the Bend Water Light & Power Company is owned by the Central Oregon Power Company, and the Central Oregon Power Company stock is owned as follows: Charles A. Brown, Chicago, 480 shares; Kempster B. Miller, Chicago, 250 shares; Richard Dewey, Chicago, 120 shares; F. R. Welles, Chicago, 120 shares; Mary E. Dewey, Chicago, 20 shares.

The Central Oregon Power Co. was formed in 1912 for the purpose of purchasing the power holdings of The Bend Company.

"Of the 750 shares of the stock of the Bend Water Light & Power Company 745 are held by Kempster B. Miller as trustee for the Central Oregon Power Company; the other five shares are held by the officers to make them eligible for office."

With the facts before it which were brought out in the hearing last week the commission will now decide on a valuation of the company's property on which it is entitled to a return at the present time, and fix the rates which may be charged by the company accordingly. The date on which the findings of the commission may be expected is not known.
