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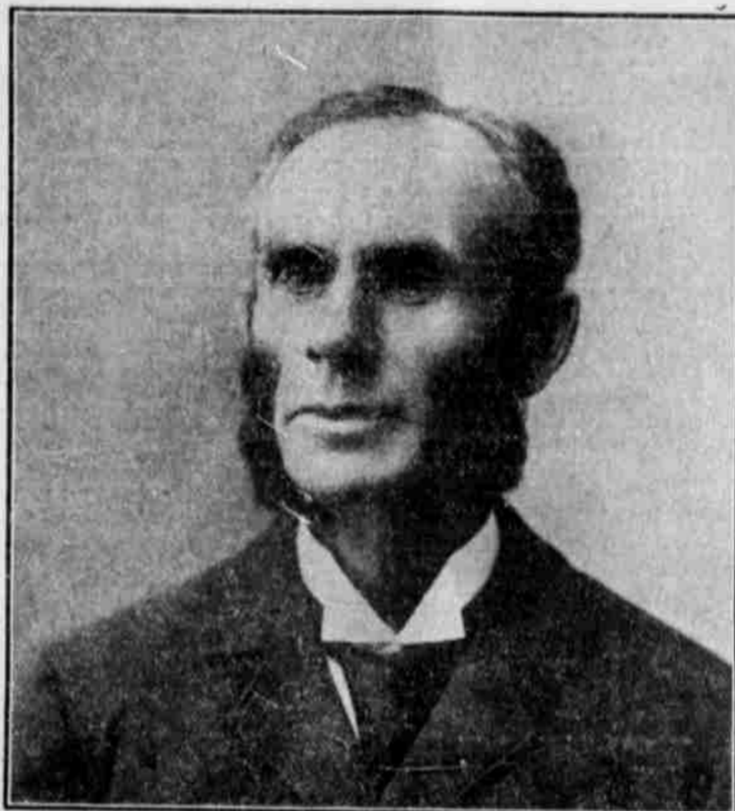

**Professor Thomas Shaw
Agricultural Expert**

(By D. C. Freeman.)
Prof. Thos. Shaw, who is to lecture before the granges of Crook county next week and who has accepted an invitation to deliver a special address before the Bend Commercial Club Wednesday evening, June 2, has had a most interesting career. He occupies an unique position as a preceptor in matters agricultural, as well as home life on the farm.
Versatile is a word that can be rightfully applied to Dr. Shaw. He is a farmer, teacher, text-book author, lecturer, essayist, and expert judge of livestock. His knowledge of chemistry extends far enough to analyze soil and diagnose them so simply that the ordinary tiller of the soil can get them and apply remedies with a comprehension and his ability procure.
Dr. Shaw is a living by farming 25 years before his special abilities were requisitioned by the agricultural colleges. For five years he was professor of agriculture at the Ontario Experiment Farm, Guelph, Ontario.

Canada, and following that, for 12 years he was professor of animal husbandry at the University of Minnesota. He has been employed the past six years by the Northern Pacific and Great Northern Railways holding the position of agricultural expert and conducting crop demonstrations in areas along these lines, extending from the Red River Valley to the Cascade mountains.
How, with all his other activities and editorial duties as contributor to leading farm journals, he has been able to write books is almost beyond the understanding of the average person. One has to know the professor closely and have traveled with him to be able fully to appreciate his indefatigable energy and industry.
In order to accomplish what he has accomplished it is only necessary to say that he invariably rises between 5 and 6 o'clock in the morning and one of his methods of relaxation is to write a chapter for a book, or an essay for a periodical before breakfast. Whether roughing it in pioneer settlements or meeting engagements in the cities, the doctor always and everywhere is a strenuously busy man.

"The worst, most criminal waste in the world," he remarks, "is waste of time. Time is all that is allowed man in this world and the greatest waste is doing nothing, or worse than nothing."
The doctor admits two vices. One is drinking tea and the other is writing books.
He is as great a student as he is a producer of reading matter. He is thoroughly informed on all sorts of interesting topics. He is a moral philosopher, as well as an authority on practical things, and he is compiling a number of moral essays which he intends putting into book form.
Dr. Shaw is one of the most earnest and convincing speakers before the public today. He is one of the strongest and most consistent advocates of country life and its advantages as compared with city life for the individual. He holds that, with the modern advantages enjoyed today in even remote rural districts, country life is more beneficial and

returns more to the individual who would enjoy life fully than the city.
In reply to the question as to why country life is better, Dr. Shaw said: "On the farm you are sure of a living.
"On the farm is the best way to provide for the future.
"On the farm, with reasonable industry, there is no excuse for doing without many of the little conveniences which would place the country home on a par with the city house for comfort.
"On the farm is the best refuge for you in time of uncertainties and panics and freedom from the taxation and regulation of the city.
"On the farm is the proper place to solve the problem of the high cost of living—do with less, or, do without."

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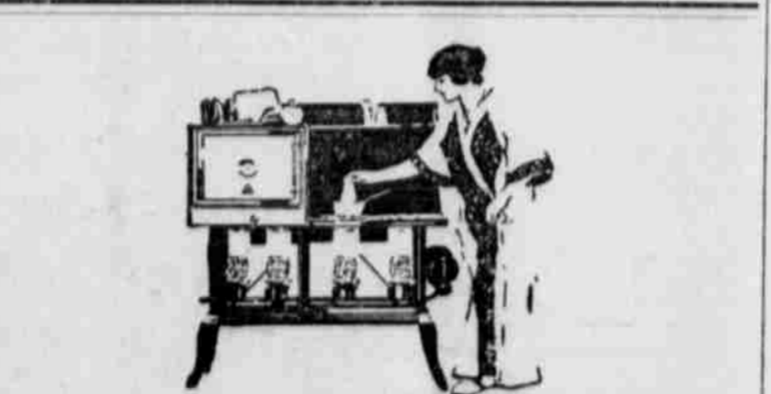
