

WILL PROVIDE WOMEN'S ROOM

ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED LAST WEEK

City Takes Lease of Council Chamber

—Rear End to Be Partitioned off for Rest Room—Commercial Club to Provide the Furniture

A rest room for the use of visiting women, and especially for the wives of the farmers in the neighboring country, is to be provided here through the joint activity of the Commercial Club and the Parent-Teacher Association. The city also has a part in the work by providing quarters in the rear of the room occupied as the council chamber in the Johnson building.

According to the plan worked out by the directors of the Commercial Club and joint committees from the club and the association the club will supply lumber with which to build a partition in the rear of the council chamber, thus setting off a room 16x26. A door will be cut in the south side of the building and a walk run back from the street so that the room may be reached without going into the council chamber. The club will also furnish the room and supply linoleum while the association undertakes to care for the room.

In order to justify the necessary expense it was thought best to obtain a lease on the premises. This was done through the council which obtained a lease until January 1, 1917. In consideration of the amount to be expended by the club the council has agreed to assume the full amount of the rent.

The desirability of providing such a room has long been recognized here but the matter was never seriously considered until the Parent-Teacher Association took it up with the Commercial Club several weeks ago. In the present room there will be comfortable chairs and couches where women may rest or take their lunches when shopping in town. Toilet facilities will also be provided. The room is expected to be a great convenience during Chautauqua week.

which arrangements were made to issue warrants payable at a later date to be taken up by the public subscription.

After yesterday's meeting Mr. Payne requested The Bulletin to offer the thanks of his company for the action taken.

The amount stated at the meeting to be needed for the purchase was \$6020 made up of the following items August Dryer, \$1000, W. A. Bates, \$2000, John Fry, \$1980 and traveling expenses, \$40. The arrangement with Mr. Fry included the payment to him of \$500 and the selection of lots in Deschutes addition to make 200 front feet with \$20 expenses to come to make the selection. These lots total in value \$1450, making his whole payment \$1980.

The total subscription amounts to \$1044 or over \$1,000 more than was necessary. Since the closing of the lists offers of additional assistance have come in which would bring the total well up toward \$5000. To show his interest in the matter Mr. Bates has himself subscribed \$1000. The balance of subscriptions over the amount necessary to be raised will
