KNOW YOUR OWN TOWN.

"Mayor Thompson of Chicago says civic enthusiasm is necessary to a city's development. He says every resident should be a publicity agent, loaded with information and ready at all times to distribute it. In addressing some newspaper men the other day he advised:

"Talk about Chicago, boys. You have the best theme in the world for news stories. Even Chicago herself needs to be educated concerning her vast possibilities. We never advertise the good things of this old town, and we ought to. It's a time to get our backs up and brag about the beauties of Chicago. We should let the world know about our great playgrounds for the children, our parks, buildings and our public schools."

"Chicago's mayor is right. Every resident of a city should be a publicity agent. Every resident should know the city's good points, its places of interest, how to reach them and what the stranger can expect to see. The residents of a city should be enthusiastic over the town they live in. If they are not enthusiastic, what can be expected of visitors, who judge a town by what they see and the attitude of its people toward their own possessions and possibilities."

"Portland will have thousands of visitors this summer. Many of them will be representative people in their own communities. Some of them may be looking for investments. All of them will have potential value as Portland boosters, and that value will depend largely upon impressions received from Portland people. ***

"What is needed now is more civic spirit. It is an obligation resting upon each individual. Portland people should know Portland and its environs. They should be ready at all times to inform the stranger, to suggest points of interest, to tell what Portland has and what it intends to get."

"It's a time to get our backs up and brag about our own city. Portland people should remember that the average visitor is not a patient pilgrim willing to spend valuable time learning the way about. He ready to direct him. A five-minute street-corner conversation may decide whether Portland will have an influential friend or an indifferent guest."

The foregoing are extracts from an editorial in the Oregon Journal on Portland.

It goes for Bend, too.

REASON TO BE SATISFIED.

Horses are at a premium, due to the war. Hogs are at a premium, thanks to the law of supply and demand. Cattle are at a premium, because there doesn't seem to be enough to go around. Wheat is at a premium, because the United States just at present must produce most of the bread of the world. Wool shows signs of good prices and satisfactory demands, inasmuch as the woolen mills of the country are working over time. The market for pine lumber is far and away better than that of any other western timber products, and promises steady improvement.

All these things Central Oregon produces.

Therefore why should not Central Oregon and Bend, its metropolis, be satisfied?

The action of the British Government in retaining Kitchener at the head of military affairs despite the criticism which recently has been directed against him reminds that at no time has there been a military leader in war time who has not been flayed by the press and many of the people. Search the files of the early 60's and you may read what an incompetent failure was Grant or Lincoln, for instance. It is the judgment of later years that fixes the measure of a man's worth at times of stress, and most Americans believe "K of K" will have laurels instead of odium as his final reward. And in the mean time Kitchener doubtless sympathizes with Napoleon's feelings when the Corsican said "Four hostile newspapers are more to be dreaded than a hundred thousand bayonets."

It is interesting to note that the majority of the prize essays in the recent contest among Portland public school pupils were written by foreign-born boys and girls. The characteristic of these new-comers was simplicity. They exercised their new language carefully and sparingly. There was a striking and appro-

prate unaffectedness in the words they used and the way they used them. And in contrast to the satisfactory simplicity and straightforward unity of their work the essays of the native-born, for the most part, appeared artificial, involved and full of weak attempts at rhetorical elegance. For the most part they evinced literary snobbery. All of which contains a useful hint for those who teach our boys and girls how to use their English language.

A party of fishermen came to Bend the other day for what the Deschutes offered them in the way of sport. That was a special evidence of the drawing power of trout. Scores of other individuals came hereabout for the fishing. In short, the Deschutes trout are an important asset; they mean much to us already and they can and will be made to mean far more. Therefore it is particularly fortunate that we have been given a hatchery, so that, with proper administration, there is every reason to believe that instead of our fishing getting worse it will get better.

In his statement the other day concerning our international situation, Governor Withycombe said: "Peace is desirable almost above all else, but there are prices which the United States must never willingly pay for peace." And that is a most admirable platform echoing the feelings of the great majority of thinking Americans.

Reporting a meeting of the Lake County Editorial Association the Silver Lake Leader says: "Late in the afternoon the visiting editors came in their cars." Lake county editors must be prosperous.

"My advice is to stick to hogs, forage crops and good dairy stock." That suggestion offered Crook county

farmers by Governor Withycombe is impossible to be better as a first agricultural commandment.

Copies of the 1915 Session Laws are now procurable for \$1.35. There are 265 new measures. That brings the cost of each law to a trifle over half a cent. A number of them are worth more than that.
