

# FREIGHT GOING TO SUMMER LAKE

## IS J. MOORE TO BEGIN WORK?

Reports Are That Material Will Be Delivered Soon—Doubt Is Expressed as to Building Pipe Line to Mouth of Deschutes River.

(Portland Telegram.) SILVER LAKE, June 1.—The arrival of a big quantity of material for the construction of a temporary retaining plant at Summer lake apparently confirms the report received here last week that the syndicate headed by Jason C. Moore will start work at once on a plant for the separation of salts and other minerals from the waters of Abert and Summer lakes.

Overland freighters have unloaded piles of material at the south end of Summer Lake, where, it is presumed, the preliminary work will start. Several loads of lumber, machinery and wagons already are on the ground, and those who freighted the material from the railroad terminal report that much more is to follow immediately.

Persons in charge of the present work are reticent regarding the much advertised pipe-line to be built from Summer lake to the mouth of the Deschutes river. Disinterested engineers still regard the pipe-line talk with considerable skepticism. From an economic standpoint, it is said, the construction of a railroad from the present terminals, either at Lakeview or Bend, would have a big advantage over the pipe-line plan. Rights of way already have been surveyed from these places.

Before the losses of the lakes can reach the most valuable deposits of mineral—the deposits in the beds of the lakes—it will be necessary to divert the flow of Anna river, a stream that now empties into Summer lake at the northernmost end. A new channel that will carry Anna river around Summer lake to the east has been surveyed, and the changing of the course of this stream is said to present no difficult engineering task.

Anna river has its source only a few miles to the north of the lake. It bubbles from the ground in the biggest artesian well in the world, cutting its way through a deep channel across a sea of sage brush until it reaches the head of Summer lake.

returning from a three day's fishing trip above Benham Falls. 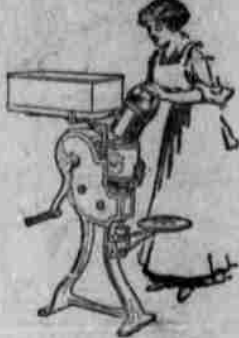
