"We all know and esteem Mr. Dana, who made the interview, and feel indebted to him for developing certain conditions in hotels, ticket offices, etc., but I take the liberty of writing to you to assure you that we have consistently exploited Central Oregon and other districts for tourists as well as settlers ever since the Oregon Trunk Ry. was opened.
