## MARKET REPORT.

NORTH PORTLAND, June 17.—The receipts for the week have been: Cattle 1564, calves 36, hogs 4016, sheep 4142. Cattle prices a shade lower than last week. Nearly all consignments are grass cattle, quality not above the average. Bulk steers sell around \$7 to \$7.25, cows as high as \$6.75. Hogs remain steady at \$8. Not many loads of well finished stuff came forward and consid-

ing quality prices held well. A fair run of sheep for the week with prices lower and market inactive. Spring lambs are coming in small consignments only. Choice lambs are selling at \$7.50, ewes \$5 and wethers at \$5.50.
