**LAKE COUNTY IS
AFTER SAM HILL**

**PAPERS DISLIKE HIS
ROADS**

Silver Lake and Fort Rock Weeklies Object to New Location of Pacific Highway Which Runs Route Far To the East of Those Towns.

While Prineville road enthusiasts continue to work with and for Samuel Hill in his efforts to bring all Central Oregon travel through his home town in Washington, some of the Lake county folks, who are now finding themselves left to one side of a new road he is reported to be selecting, have begun to kick over the traces.

Mr. Hill recently traveled through to Lakeview in one day and advertised the fact widely. He was accompanied by his protegee Majer H. L. Bowby, formerly state highway engineer of Oregon, and some feature of the trip, in spite of the praise he gave it at the time, must have been unpleasant for in the past week he has been back into Lake county re-locating what he calls the "Pacific highway." And this is bringing out the kicks.

In the Silver Lake Leader last week under the head lines "Tax payers interests muffed." Samuel Hill would disregard the interests of people who pay the bill" there is reported a meeting between Mr. Hill and County Judge Smith, of which it says "the object of this meeting was the locating of the route through this county of the Central Oregon Pacific Highway." Mr. Hill seems determined to put the road through the most barren part of the county, where it will not be of easy access to the majority of the tax payers of the county.

"The foundation for the Highway, through the rich and thickly settled part of the county has already been established by the citizens, and a large amount of expense put thereon.

"It is said that the argument for putting the road across the eastern desert is to avoid the Paulina snows, but experience of years in this vicinity has taught the residents that the proposed cut-off north of Fort Rock is the most free from winter snows of any other possible route that might be laid out."

Now the Fort Rock Times joins the chorus with the following:
"A nice little plot seems to be on foot to place the Central Oregon highway in the eastern part of this county, running it over rocky ridges, sand dunes and other poor pieces of roads from Prineville to Lakeview, skipping Fort Rock and Silver Lake

by many miles. It is reported that County Assessor A. J. Foster, County Judge E. H. Smith, Sam Hill, good roads man of Maryhill, Washington, a Mr. Smith of Prineville, and a number of others met at Lake during the past day or two and decided that the Central Oregon highway shall pass through that section of the county. Prineville is only five miles east of a line running due north from Fort Rock and it looks odd indeed to see these officials direct traffic fifteen miles further out of its course and over a territory with hardly any stopping places when they could come almost due south and pass through a number of towns."
