

POWER COMPANY HOLDS MEETING

**JOHN E. RYAN IS NEW
VICE PRESIDENT**

Bend Water Light & Power Co. Chooses Officials for Coming Year—President Brown Interviewed on Local Affairs by Journal.

John E. Ryan has been elected vice president of the Bend Water Light & Power Co. to succeed J. P. Keyes, whose resignation was offered at the recent meeting of the company. Other officers elected were C. A. Brown, president and K. B. Miller, secretary, the board of directors consisting of these two and Messrs. John E. Ryan, T. H. Foley and V. A. Forbes.

According to statements made by a representative of the company the connection of Mr. Ryan with the Shevlin-Hixon Company and the business connections which may be made between that company and the Bend Water Light & Power Co. make his association with the power company advantageous to both, while his practical business experience will be of great assistance to his new associates.

Pres. Brown in Portland.
Charles A. Brown, president of the company, left here Thursday night following the annual meeting. While in Portland he was interviewed concerning local matters, the report of the interview appearing in the Journal as follows:

"Citizens of Bend will vote August 9 on the question of allowing a competing light and power company to enter the field now held by the Bend Water Light and Power Company. The council had passed an ordinance granting a franchise to the Steidl-Tweet Company, Mayor Miller vetoed it and the council passed it again over the veto. The verdict of the citizens is now invoked by the referendum started by the B. W. L. & P. Co.

President in Portland.
"C. A. Brown of Chicago, president of the company now supplying the city who is in Portland today, stated that the Steidl-Tweet interests have asked permission to compete on the strength of a power right acquired in exchange for concessions made to an irrigation project. This right allows them the use of one-half of the water passing over the irrigation dam in excess of 1950 cubic feet per second. In July and August, when the greatest call is made upon the irrigation ditch, little more than 500 feet of water flows over the dam per second which, Mr. Brown says, would leave less than nothing for the generation of electric power.

"Our company has ample financial reserves and is now prepared to make extensions at a cost of \$50,000. These are not being made, however, until we know whether we are to be deprived of part of the revenues we are now receiving and be obliged to divide the revenues to be expected as the city grows.

"I believe in the regulation of public utilities and our company has submitted all the data demanded to the Oregon commission which is expected to hand down a ruling next week on the justice of our rates. I believe, however, as does the commission itself, that this regulation should give companies protection from indiscriminate competition.

Outlook Indicates Prosperity
"Mr. Brown declared his belief that Bend is about to enter upon a rapid growth, starting with the construction of the Shevlin-Hixon mill. Following this, the Brooks mill is under consideration, the projects giving prospective employment to hundreds of men. The extension of the Oregon Eastern from Riverton towards Bend is another factor which Mr. Brown foresees will be a healthful influence on the Central Oregon metropolis.

"The B. W. L. & P. Company is figuring with the Shevlin for the supplying of power to operate their mill. Other projects under contemplation will utilize other units of the excess potential energy from the company's big power dam. The present plant is constructed so as to allow installation of another water wheel without cutting upon other power units capable of development, if this plant should require it."

JURY AWARDS MEDAL

Standard Oil Co. Given Recognition at San Francisco Fair.

has dealt with its employees, its customers and the public, and for the methods it has developed in producing, transporting, refining and selling petroleum.

"Another award in which we feel a deep sense of gratification, is the gold medal for our conservation methods in the oil fields. This company has always bent every effort toward eliminating waste in the production of petroleum and has initiated and placed in operation many devices and methods tending toward conservation and efficient operation of oil wells."

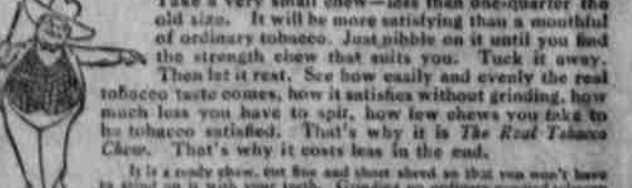
