WITHYCOMBE INSPECTS TUMALO

(Continued from page 1.)

S. P. & S. system under whose escort the party made its trip from Portland. Touching on the resources of Central Oregon Mr. Wilkes said that timber furnished 26 per cent of all the freight carried on his company's lines and agricultural products another 26 per cent. Both of these exist here and a big new boom is about to be given the lumber industry by the erection of a large mill. "Bend," said Mr. Wilkes, "is the only town on our lines where a mill is being built and where a single length of rail is being laid."

Following Mr. Wilkes, remarks were made by Insurance Commissioner Harvey Wells, Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott, Industrial Accident Commissioner Carl Abrams and Attorney General George W. Brown, making the number who had to leave for the night train. Mr. Olcott amusingly described his feelings on the recent addition of twins to his family and Mr. Brown spoke in a patriotic vein urging that the present was the time for true Americanism and patriotic thinking.

After the departure of these guests V. A. Forbes spoke on irrigation con-

ditions in this section. Mr. Forbes pointed out the differences in the situation on the Tumalo project from that of the C. O. I. Co. and expressed the hope that some solution for the difficulties of the latter might be worked out by the co-operation of the settlers, the company, and the Desert Land Board.

Guy Lafollette told of early experiences here before the town of Bend existed. He said that he had seen the town grow from nothing and he felt that as Prineville's interests were naturally different from Bend's the two towns would naturally pull apart. That was why he was for county division which he expected to take place soon.

"The 'fish course' of the program, according to Toastmaster Hudson, was provided by the speeches of I. N. Fleischner, C. F. Stone and Frank M. Warren, members of the Oregon

Fish and Game Commission. Mr. Fleischner told of his first trip to Central Oregon 25 years ago and Mr. Stone said, in the words of a story he told, "that a man who 'sint seen Bend, 'sint seen nothing." Mr. Warren promised assistance of the commission in seeing that this section was supplied with fish and game.

County Commissioner Overturf impressed on his hearers the need for bigness and for overcoming local prejudice in working for the best interests of the county while Representative Wesley O. Smith disclaimed any of the credit for the passage of the Tumalo act, saying that the spirit and unanimity of the people themselves passed it.

A hint of possible railroad activity in Central Oregon was given by G. P. Putnam who paid a tribute to Governor Withycombe and his desire to do nothing else in office but "make good."

Governor Withycombe's speech was the concluding one of the evening. He echoed the patriotic sentiments of Attorney General Brown and touched on the situation in which the United States found itself today. Speaking of local affairs the governor said that it was impossible to underestimate the power of such unanimity and enthusiasm as he found here. The same unity, he said, should find a solution of the C. O. I. Co. problems. His only ambition was to serve his constituents well and he was with us in all good work.
