

CHAUTAQUA TO START FRIDAY

EVERYTHING IS READY FOR EVENT

Rev. H. C. Hartranft to Deliver Address of Welcome—First Concert is by Adelpians—Two Programs Given Daily for Six Days Here.

Everything is in readiness for the first Bend chautauqua which begins Friday afternoon as advertised. Allen R. Nieman, the advance agent of the Chautauqua system has been here since Sunday, J. Joel Dyrche, head property man comes in Thursday morning with the tent which will be put in place at once on the lot between the old bank building and the Johnson building on Wall street. Miss Miller, the young lady who will have charge of the morning program for children for the week and Lester V. Murphy, the Chautauqua superintendent, will arrive Friday morning and everything will be ready for the first program Friday afternoon at 2:30.

Miss Miller, who will have complete charge of the Junior Chautauqua, is well prepared to handle the children in a way that only an expert can and all the holders of the children season tickets should not fail to meet her on Saturday morning at 9 a. m. in the tent. The first part of the morning is taken up with the kind of stories that the young folks like to hear, then the play hour comes and Miss Miller will tell of the best kind of games that all the boys and girls like to play. There will be also folk dancing by the children representing the children of all nations. The first 25 boys and girls who bring their tickets to The Bulletin office will receive an Indian war bonnet free.

In the afternoon after Rev. H. C. Hartranft has introduced Superintendent Murphy, he will give a short response and introduce the Adelpian quartette and from then on there will not be an idle moment, until there have been heard in their turns all the companies and lectures that are to be there. Every program contains music and a lecture or entertainment by a great artist.

Friday evening, after the quartette has given an hour's concert, Col. William Hamilton Miller will give his famous community lecture, "The Neighboring City." Of Col. Miller it is said that when one has heard him once, he will never forget him. He is said to have more stories to the inch than any other platform speaker and can talk faster than any record set by "Maude S."

On Saturday there will be another musical treat in the concerts that the quartette will give and all are urged to hear their "Old Home Program." In the evening, they sing all the old songs that are ever new to all and which all love to hear. Also in the afternoon Col. Miller will give another lecture which will be as "funny" and as full of good sense as his first one was. If you want to be stirred to a better patriotic life you must hear his lecture, "The Hobbie Skirts of Freedom." Saturday evening Marion Ballou Fish, the wonderful "lady chalk talker" will give her first lesson on "Kweer Characters," in which may be recognized some of the queer characters of Bend.

Sunday the Fourth there will be two concerts by the Royal Hungarian Orchestra, and Mrs. Fisk will give her other lecture "Cap'n Tommy." In the evening Miss Bergh will sing with the complete orchestra accompanying her and A. A. Franke "the little giant of the platform" will give his lecture, "The Matchless Book."

Again on Monday there will be two programs from the orchestra and one from Miss Bergh and another lecture from Dr. Franke, and Miss La Dell the "Child Impersonator" will be heard the first time in the evening.

Tuesday afternoon the Jubilee singers will be heard for the first time and Miss La Dell will also give another program of humorous readings. In the evening after the Jubilee singers finish their program Senator Burkett will give "The New Woman and the Young Man." On Wednesday morning at 9 Miss Miller will give a talk to mothers and a demonstration of the work that she has been carrying on all week. In the afternoon the Jubilee singers will give a full program and in the evening they will give an hour program after which the concluding lecture will be given by Senator Burkett in his "Government Ownership of Railroads."
