WARRANTS ARE ISSUED

Subscribers to Fund Receive 15 Per Cent Rebate and Statement.

Warrants representing the subscriptions to the fund for the purchase of the tracts needed for the Shevlin-Hixon mill pond were mailed to all subscribers last week with check for 15 per cent of the subscription in each case, the fund having been oversubscribed that amount.

To each subscriber was sent also, an itemized statement of the receipts and the disbursement of the fund. The total amount subscribed was \$7114 and the 15 per cent was \$1067.10. The disbursements were \$6026.94, leaving a cash balance of \$1087.16 to be turned over to the city. In the itemized list of disbursements it appeared that \$856.40 was paid to William Bates when the actual payment was \$1856.40, a blurred figure in the copy sent to the printer having caused the mistake to be made.

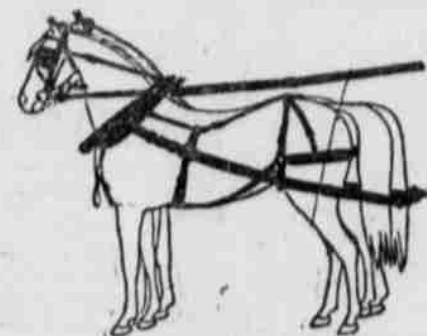
