

STATE WARDEN HERE

Carl D. Shoemaker Makes Inspection Trip Through This Section.
On a trip of inspection and to get acquainted with the warden and game conditions on the east side of the Cascades Carl D. Shoemaker, recently appointed state game warden, arrived in Bend late Thursday night. Mr. Shoemaker motored here from Lakeview. Friday he spent here in company with District Deputy Warden McKay, visiting the fish hatchery and the ponds now in use on the Tumalo, leaving for Burns on Saturday morning.
Mr. Shoemaker's home is in Roseburg where he is the publisher of the Daily News. While here he collected material for an article on this section to be published in his paper. Mr. Shoemaker's appointment as warden by Governor Withcomb is conceded to be a strong one and is giving universal satisfaction.

EXPERIMENT IS PROVING VALUE

at Millican. On demonstration plots all farms failed to obtain a stand of Sweet Clover because of the looseness of the seed bed. A few seeds of this crop, however, planted on hard ground at Hampton have grown and the plants prove that this crop will pay in this section. The Dry Land alfalfa is yet very young, but a good stand has been obtained and the crop is promising.
"A very noticeable and valuable point for all dry land farmers is demonstrated on the farm at Hampton where the Early Hart Wheat is practically all killed excepting where the wheels of the drill packed the seed, and in these rows the crop is green, tall and healthy.
"Conclusions that may safely be drawn at this time are that Spring

grains, excepting possibly Emmer, do not pay on the dry land, especially where severe frosts visit the country. Field Peas, Sweet Clover and Dry Land Alfalfa will at least grow. Time will tell how well they will pay. A press drill is necessary for best success in planting grains on a sandy soil. To insure success where there are many rabbits, it is necessary to fence against the pest. Where rats appear, even in small numbers, they should be poisoned or in some other way destroyed when they first appear in the spring.
"There are hundreds of homesteaders in the high desert country, and all who are trying to farm have been experimenting along the same lines as on these demonstration farms. By taking note of the work and results on these farms, they will find at once that spring grains do not pay. Because of success of other crops, they can plainly see that a well prepared seed bed will grow crops most years. Fall grains will be planted in demonstration plots in this section this fall, but only on summer fallow land as we know that other lands will not pay from experience in less exposed sections."
Notes of Value to Dry Farmers.
"The man who is farming on dry land in this section should be anxious to obtain all the information possible regarding best practice and then to put this information into practice on his farm. Any increased yields may be figured as profit. The following items when considered may prove of value to the dry farmer:
"On sandy soils the disc drill or any other form of drill, excepting the press drill, will leave the soil too loose about the grain seed to insure a good germination and perfect stand, beside allowing the soil to dry out too deep for most successful growth of crop. In purchasing a
