

**NEW ROAD TO CRATER LAKE**

**Superintendent Steel Reports Route Which Saves Time From Bend.**  
 Manager De Armond, of the Commercial Club, has received a letter from Will G. Steel, superintendent of Crater Lake National Park, announcing the opening of a new entrance to the park which materially shortens the distance between Bend and Crater Lake. Local tourists who have been over the new road report that it turns off on the right hand side about eight miles beyond Sand Creek and that it is in good condition all the way in to the lake.  
 Mr. Steel's letter is as follows:  
 "Your attention is kindly called to the fact that a new entrance to the Crater Lake National Park has just been opened to the public, to be known as the Pinnacles Entrance. It is located about 3 miles north of the south eastern corner of the park and is reached by turning directly to the right, at a point 53 miles south of Crescent, at which place a sign is located. Parties from North Central Oregon can save about 20 miles to Rogue river points by taking this route.

**AN ALUMINUM PLANT**

**Increased Use of Metal Means Possible Development Here.**

The demand for aluminum has increased within a few weeks to such an extent that the price of ingots has jumped from nineteen to thirty-five cents, and even at the present price foundries cannot keep up with their orders.  
 All the eight and twelve cylinder automobile engines for 1916 will have aluminum pistons, and some of them will have all of the engine castings of that metal, with cast iron liners for the cylinders.  
 The use of aluminum is increasing by leaps and bounds, and the twentieth century may mark the transition from the iron to the aluminum age.  
 Valuable deposits of clay from which aluminum may be secured by a new and economical process exist in various localities near Bend.  
 These deposits, the hydro-electric power which Bend has to offer, and good transportation by the railroads warrant the expectation of the establishment of a reduction plant here in the not distant future.

**HARVESTING IN FULL BLAST**

**Winter Wheat Returning Better Yields Than Expected.**

Threshing in the fields north of Bend is now in full swing since the rains of last week. Headers moved in to many of the fields in the Lamonta, Agency Plains and Grizzly districts last Monday and the heading there is well under way.  
 Reports by grain men who have been through the district where cutting is now going on say that the crop of winter wheat in most of the sections is turning out far better than was expected a few weeks ago. The acreage sown to winter wheat last fall is heavier than in former years and yields are expected to be better by a considerable margin than for the spring sown grain. At the Agency Plains district there will be less straw than usual for winter wheat, but the heads are well filled and have not suffered from the recent dry spell.  
 Haying in the Redmond and Powell Butte districts has been in progress for several weeks and creditable yields are reported by farmers.

**MARKET REPORT.**  
**NORTH PORTLAND, Aug. 2**—For the last three Mondays steers have reached the seven cent mark—while the market seems to show plenty of strength and good stuff, although of course this class of cattle is not coming in freely. Out of the 1000 head on the market at the beginning of the week only two or three loads can show this class. Most of the offerings are mediocre, the usual number of second rate cattle being in evidence. For ordinary cows and heifers the market seems at early date fairly steady. Only a few hundred head over 2000 hogs were registered over Sunday—outside of a few loads that were able to spring the close of last weeks at \$7.15 all lines ruled steady the bulk at an early date going at \$7.00 to \$7.10. Trade was active. The largest sheep receipts for a single day in the last few months were in this morning, over 5,000 head being totaled. Good lambs were selling at \$6.25 with all other lines steady at last week's selling price.
