



SEC. 51, CHAPTER 279, SESSION LAWS OF 1911-DEFINING DUTIES OF COMMISSION.

"WHENEVER, UPON AN INVESTIGATION MADE UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT, THE COMMISSION SHALL FIND ANY EX-ISTING RATE OR RATES, OR ANY SCHEDULE OF RATES, TOLLS, CHARGES, JOINT RATE OR JOINT RATES TO BE UNJUST, UNREAS-ONABLE, INSUFFICIENT OR UNJUSTLY DISCRIMINATORY OR TO BE PREFERENTIAL OR OTHERWISE IN VIOLATION OF ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT, THE COMMISSION SHALL DETER-MINE AND BY ORDER FIX REASONABLE RATE OR RATES, SCHED-ULE OF RATES, TOLLS, CHARGES OR JOINT RATES TO HE IMPOS-ED, OBSERVED AND FOLLOWED IN THE FUTURE IN LIEU OF THOSE FOUND TO BE UNJUST, UNREASONABLE, INSUFFICIENT OR UNJUSTLY DISCRIMINATORY OR PREFERENTIAL OR OTHERWISE INVIOLATION OF ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT.
