Anyone can make rates for political effect—but the rates to be charged depend on the action of the Public Utilities Commission. Read the law:

SEC. 51, CHAPTER 279, SESSION LAWS OF 1911—DEFINING DUTIES OF COMMISSION.

"WHENEVER, UPON AN INVESTIGATION MADE UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT, THE COMMISSION SHALL FIND ANY EXISTING RATE OR RATES, OR ANY SCHEDULE OF RATES, TOLLS, CHARGES, JOINT RATE OR JOINT RATES TO BE UNJUST, UNREASONABLE, INSUFFICIENT OR UNJUSTLY DISCRIMINATORY OR TO BE PREFERENTIAL OR OTHERWISE IN VIOLATION OF ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT, THE COMMISSION SHALL DETERMINE AND BY ORDER FIX REASONABLE RATE OR RATES, SCHEDULE OF RATES, TOLLS, CHARGES OR JOINT RATES TO BE IMPOSED, OBSERVED AND FOLLOWED IN THE FUTURE IN LIEU OF THOSE FOUND TO BE UNJUST, UNREASONABLE, INSUFFICIENT OR UNJUSTLY DISCRIMINATORY OR PREFERENTIAL OR OTHERWISE IN VIOLATION OF ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT."
