For instance, the taxes as originally charged on a certain property amount to \$100.00; paid in full on September 15, 1915, the total amount required would be \$110.50, a penalty of 10 per cenf (\$10.00) and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum for 15 days (\$0.50) being added to the original

"4. Section 1 of Chapter 156, ws of 1915, amending Section 3682, Lord's Oregon Laws, and pro-viding in part that "The first half or all taxes legally levied and charged shall be paid on or before the fifth day of April following, and the secend half on or before the fifth day of October following," has no application whatever to taxes charged on tax rolls of the year 1914. Said section will become effective in 1916 and apply in the payment of taxes to be charged on the 1915 rolls.

Sections 2 and 3 of Chapter 156, Laws of 1915, amending Sections 3683 and 3687, Lord's Oregon Laws, are now in effect. Therefore, the Tax Collector is to make his annual statement and tax return, also proceed to collect delinquent taxes on personalty, on or immediately after October 5, 1915, instead of September 1 as heretofore.
