TO TAKE VOTE ON BOND ISSUE

IRRIGATION PROJECT IS APPROVED

Crew of 25 Suttles Lake Farmers Begin Work Anticipating That \$600,000 Will be Raised to Bring Water on Arid Land District

(Oregon Journal.)
SALEM, Sept. 7.—Plans of the Suttles Lake irrigation district, in Jefferson county, for the issuance of \$600,000 in bonds for the irrigation of 12,000 acres, were approved today by State Engineer Lewis.
The district includes a total of 25,000 acres, much of which is under cultivation, according to the engineer's office. In the past many of the settlers have hauled water as far as 14 and 12 miles for stock and domestic streams. The rainfall is insufficient for dry farming and irrigation is a necessity.
A dam 54 feet high will be constructed to store 21,500 acre feet of

water in Blue and Suttles lakes, at the head of the Metolius river, and a canal 12 miles in length will carry water across the divide south of Black Butte, and to the lands lying on the west side of the Deschutes river. The estimated cost is approximately \$50 per acre.
The state engineer's approval was based on information furnished by George S. Young, project engineer; O. Laurgaard, consulting engineer, and a field inspection by Percy A. Copper, assistant state engineer.

Action will be taken today by the officers of the Suttles Lake Irrigation District to set a date for the election in which the Grandview farmers will determine whether they will vote a \$600,000 bond issue to carry on the Suttles Lake irrigation project. The date for the election will probably be October 11.
Believing that State Engineer Lewis would act favorably upon the reports of engineers George S. Young, of Bend, O. Laurgaard, of Portland, and Percy Copper, Assistant State Engineer of Salem, all of whom have been engaged for some months in making surveys of the proposed project, a crew of 25 men under H. J. Chensworth is now engaged in preliminary work at the dam site. During the last week 700 feet of main canal was constructed and a 100 foot clearing was made for the dam.

LEGAL FENCE-DEFINED.

Having been requested to publish the Oregon definition of a legal fence the Bulletin quotes from Lord's Oregon Laws, Section 5778 as follows: "Any structure, hedge or ditch, in the nature of a fence used for purposes of enclosure, which is such as good husbandmen generally use, and as shall on the testimony of skillful men appear to be sufficient, shall be deemed a lawful fence for all purposes in all counties east of the Cascade mountains in the State of Oregon." Elsewhere in the state the definition found in Section 5779 apparently prevails.
