

SENATORS DON'T SEE REAL WAR

CORRESPONDENTS ARE GUARDED

**Percy Pringle With Canadian Army
Writes Brother That Trench Life
is Monotonous—Recommendation
Made for Advancement.**

United States senators or former United States senators, in obtaining war facts concerning the maneuvers of belligerent armies in Europe for their publications in America do so, not as the proverbial war correspondent, hazarding everything to get a "scoop" but under the most careful guidance of an aide-de-camp to whom such duties are designated by headquarters. These senator-war correspondents, according to Percy Pringle, brother of A. M. Pringle of Bend, who is in the trenches with the Canadian volunteers in Flanders, reconnoiter the field of action at long range, glean such facts from the fray as may come to them through their news sense or dictated by some staff officer.

Such is the criticism given by Mr. Pringle in a letter received by his brother of the recent accounts by former United States Senator Albert J. Beveridge, who in the war zone, has been writing special articles for Colliers. This modern type of war correspondent seldom, if ever gets into the trenches and "write up" the doings in the subterranean passages from first hand habitation there.

That life in the trenches is a hubbub, scramble, replete with excitement day after day, charging, and hand-to-hand encounters at close range is a false impression under which the American reading public is laboring is stated by Pringle who says that except for an occasional encounter or order to "charge" trench life is a monotony to which few men these days anywhere are subjected. Day after day soldiers await the action of Teutonic armies who have been preparing for a big advance on the western lines held by the Canadians in Flanders.

"The Hon. Senator's views," writes Pringle, "are very interesting from the staff officer's side of this struggle but he has about as much idea of our life as he has of a Dog Rib Indian of the North. Of course he is taken in charge by some officer specially designated to conduct rubberneck parties and he never gets into the trenches. It's a good thing he doesn't for I'm afraid he would be somewhat disillusioned. Talk about drudging. Why, with the excitement of a little glamour and excitement and the unexpectedness of things I have never seen a place where men's tempers are so frayed to a frazzle by eternal fatigue as while in the trenches.

"When it comes to the individual and human side of this business we have them beaten to a frazzle, but up until the present they have it on us along the mechanical line with the exception of aviation where the superiority of the British is marked. I have sat in the trenches many times until sunset watching the aviators coming home and marveled at the fearlessness shown. First one hears the hum of the motor, and then away over behind the German lines one can see a plane small in the distance, but rapidly growing larger, coming in a straight line for home. Many times they are so low that the Germans turn machine guns and rifle fire on them, but they never waver. A Taube, on the other hand, is always so high that even with my field glasses I have trouble in making out the Iron Cross with which they are marked. Owing to our superiority in aviation our artillery is gaining the ascendancy though slowly. Don't you believe for one minute that Germany is short of ammunition. They are absolutely prodigal when it comes to an expenditure of that, and the waste is something tremendous in comparison to the damage done."

Mr. Pringle's letter is interesting from the viewpoint of a continuous inhabitant of the trenches since his arrival in Flanders. It is optimistic in the view that the Allies have strong hopes for ultimate victory, especially in the west. The activities in western Europe, he says, have not been so marked as earlier in the year, but conditions augur for a strenuous campaign following the German advances in Russia.

Mr. Pringle has been recommended for a position as commissioned officer. The advance which is expected is from the rank of sergeant.
