

## OREGON TO BE HORSE MARKET

LOCAL ANIMALS ARE WANTED

Several Thousand Head Available—Half Million Dollars May Go to Stockmen—Sheepmen Look for Unusually Prosperous Year.

That Central Oregon will be one of the biggest sources of supply for horses going to the armies of belligerent Europe, if the struggle continues through another year, is the opinion of A. J. Evans, a prominent horse buyer of St. Joseph, Missouri, who has been in this part of the state for several months buying horses for the French government.

This fact, says Mr. Evans, is not due to any scarcity of horses in the United States, because only three per cent of the horses available for military purposes have been bought up, but is due to the high grade of stock that has been purchased so far and sent to Europe.

Mr. Evans and several horse men left Monday night for St. Joseph with 100 head of horses. These, he believes, are probably as high grade animals as have gone to the front since buying began in the northwest. He is particularly interested in the Central Oregon animals owing to their soundness and freedom from many of the blemishes found in animals which buyers have been compelled to accept in some parts of the country.

### Supply is Adequate.

Any fears that the supply of horses in this part of Oregon would be exhausted or even threatened with exhaustion were dispelled by Mr. Evans when he stated that there were more available animals in this part of the state than any other where he has travelled. The fact of the matter, he says, is that many of the stockmen of the Silver Lake, Paisley and Lakeview districts have no idea how many horses they have. Up to this time more than 2,200 head of horses have left Central Oregon through Bend for war uses. There will be, he believes, equally that many more available next year. According to Mr. Evans' statement more than a half million dollars in cash will be left with Central Oregon stockmen before the close of the European war, and even when horses are brought to this amount there will be no dearth in the state. There are more horses available now than there were earlier in the year. Many of the ranchers who have completed their harvest work are offering for sale the stock they have been using.

Indications are that bidding for Oregon horse flesh will be more active in the coming six months than it has at any time this year.

Sheep men also are having a touch of prosperity with conditions pointing to a most prosperous season. There is now a demand on the coast markets for more than 12,000 head of Central Oregon mutton. Prominent sheepbuyers representing coast firms left Bend Tuesday morning for the country south of Bend to buy up several thousand head for immediate delivery. It is estimated that more than 20,000 head of sheep have already been sold out of Central Oregon. Within the next two months, according to stockmen acquainted with the situation, more than 50,000 head of sheep will pass through Bend.

### AUXILIARY PLANT BURNS

B. W. L. & P. Co. Loses by Fire—Creamery Inconvenienced.

The auxiliary pumping plant of the Bend Water Light & Power Co. was destroyed by fire late Friday afternoon, causing a loss of about \$1200 and temporarily inconveniencing the creamery which was using the plant for the production of steam and hot water. The plant was insured.

The fire was discovered by one of the employees at the creamery, apparently having started from a spark from under the boiler. By the aid of the hose from the electric pumping plant it was confined to the building in which it started.

The chief use of the plant was in the winter when anchor ice clogged the water wheels in the electrical plant, and at times when extra pressure was needed in the water mains. According to Manager T. H. Foley it will be rebuilt. For creamery uses a small boiler has been set up near the ice plant temporarily.
