

A Farmer's Organization for Crook County

Recommendations for Community and County Organization of Farmer's Clubs, (By County Agriculturist A. E. Lovett.)

Community organization in this county for the purpose of eradication of jack rabbits as a pest was recommended in an article written for the local papers last week. No movement or intimation that the suggestions made were acceptable or even considered by farmers and others have been received. The value of organization for the farmers was very concisely put forth by Dr. Macpherson while in the county in September. I am a firm believer in the need of farmer's organizations for improving our farm conditions. I am sure that material results can be accomplished in an organized effort to eradicate the rabbits as a pest. This is only one good reason for organized effort. Every rural community should have an association or club organization for three definite purposes; these purposes are as follows: "Better farming, better business, better living."

All our farm operations, our business and social dealings can be handled under such a club or association. No dues or expenses are necessary. The meetings can be held at the school house. Any work for the good of the community can be undertaken by the organizations.

The success of any organization depends upon the ability and activity of the people to be benefited thereby. Associations or clubs organized by promoters from the outside are bound to be failures unless the people themselves are interested and take an active part in supporting such organizations.

Thirteen rural community improvement clubs were organized in Crook county during the last year. Several of these are not at present active, but in those communities where they have continued active, results are noticeable as soon as one arrives in that community. One of my ambitions for the winter's work is to see a community organization in every rural community in Crook county, and see through them the organization of a county improvement club, farm bureau, or whatever we

may choose to call it. The eradication of rabbits is a good subject for attack by these organizations to start with. Opinions, suggestions and assistance are solicited from every citizen of the county. The initial movement must be made by the people themselves.

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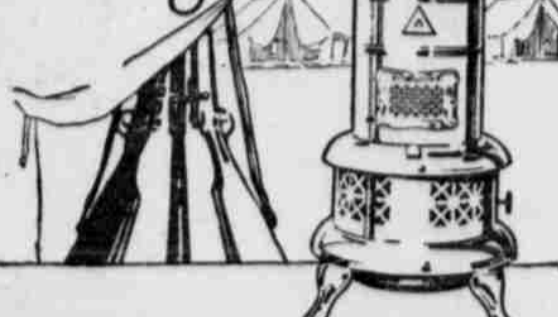
