### SENATOR HARRY LANE HERE TO LEARN OF CONDITIONS

With J. A. Eastes Makes Trip Over C. O. I. Project Yesterday—Thinks Climate Beats California.

Senator Harry Lane wandered into town Monday afternoon unheralded and unexpected, coming from Prineville by auto. As he puts it he is just wandering around the country seeing what he can see and learning at first hand what he can about conditions in the state of Oregon. Late in the afternoon he met a number of men in the Commercial Club and engaged in an informal discussion of the needs of this section in the matter of irrigation.

Tuesday, in company with J. A. Eastes, Senator Lane autoed over a large portion of the C. O. I. project in this section, observing especially the North canal lands. From this project he visited the Tumalo and then went on into the Plainview and Cloverdale neighborhoods.

The senator was very enthusiastic over the agricultural possibilities of this section as observed by him during his trip, predicting a great future in connection with local industrial development. He was impressed, also, as a physician, with its value as a health resort, saying that in his opinion it was ahead of the California climate. He left for Redmond this morning.

ted figures to show the sale of 117 lots in Kenwood since May 1, the aggregate value of which is stated to be \$25,000.  
William Gottstein, Seattle representative for Westoria property, when in Bend recently looking over

developments, stated that within the last three months Westoria property to the amount of \$12,650 had been sold to prospective home-seekers in Bend.

Hunter & Staats, who have the sale of property in Deschutes addition and nearby unplatted property report the sale of city lots to the amount of \$21,300.

J. A. Eastes, agent for Aubrey Heights lots, states that he has sold 48 lots in that part of town, the value of which is approximately \$8,000.

In addition to these figures there have been many sales by individuals both in Bend and out of town. In all it is conservatively estimated that city property sales of unimproved lots will exceed \$135,000.

As soon as sufficient materials are available real estate men predict that there will be the biggest building rush the town has ever seen. This rush, barring delays in the arrival of a sufficient quantity of building materials, is due within the next 60 days.
