

STRONG SAYS BENDS GROWTH MARVELOUS; SEES BIG FUTURE

Portland Insurance Man Finds More Activity Here Than Anywhere Else in Oregon—Stays For Meeting.

E. N. Strong, State Supervisor of agents for the Oregon Life Insurance Company of Portland, and well known in Bend, has been spending the past week here.

Mr. Strong has traveled over the state several times the last year and says there is more activity here than in any city of Oregon.

"I could hardly believe my eyes as I rode around this city the other day," said Mr. Strong to a Bulletin reporter. "I drove here for the first time by team in June, 1909, before autos or railroads were used for transportation in Central Oregon."

"The growth noted here since then is certainly marvelous, yet I believe the next six years will see even greater growth with the enormous mills now being erected, running to their full capacity and the proposed railroads for Central Oregon making their terminals here."

Mr. Strong is a member of the Oregon Development League Department of the Chamber of Commerce of Portland and has remained over for the meeting of the Central Oregon Development League today and to spend the day with A. L. Mills, president of the Oregon Life Insurance Company, who is here with the Strahorn party.

MARKET REPORT.

NORTH PORTLAND, Nov. 15.—Another light run of cattle came forward for Monday's market. There were not many head of good stuff in for sale, but the bulk of the stuff brought an equally good price as a week ago. Top steers are going at \$7 with other lines bringing steady prices. A large run of 6300 head of hogs came to North Portland yards over Sunday. Over 22,000 hogs have been received here in the past two weeks. The prices held steady with tops going at \$6.25 and bulk at \$6 to \$6.15. Monday as a sheep market is slowly coming back to its own. A small run (but of good quality) of 1300 shetep were received to day. Prime lambs were snapped up quickly at \$7.50 while ewes sold at \$5.50.

KLAMATH PLANS HEARTY WELCOME FOR STRAHORN

Program Includes Banquet and Trips Into Surrounding Country—Autos to Meet Party Near City Limits.

KLAMATH FALLS, Nov. 12.—Robert E. Strahorn and the Portland men, who are accompanying him on his trip over the route of the Oregon, California & Eastern are to receive a hearty welcome when they reach Klamath Falls about November 20. It is predicted that the affair will prove the biggest and most enthusiastic booster meeting in the county's history.

Two or three auto loads of Klamath men will motor to Bend to attend sessions of the Central Oregon Development league, and following that, they will accompany the Strahorn party in Lake county, and pilot the visitors to Klamath Falls. A delegation of 100 autoists will meet the party out of the city limits and escort it to the White Pelican hotel, where the visitors will be housed.

The program arranged includes a banquet with from 200 to 500 plates, and an attendance from all parts of Klamath county. Besides band and orchestra music, quartets, etc., there will be speeches by local men and the visiting delegation, to acquaint all concerned with the sincere interest and enthusiasm felt in the railroad extension not only in Klamath county but in the officers of the railroad company.

The second day's program will include automobile trips to Merrill, Fort Klamath and other county points, to acquaint the Portlanders with the vast expanse of rich farming territory behind Klamath Falls.
