Describing Bukharest, the capital of oumania, a statement issued by the ational Geographic society says:

"The Roumanians have spared no efort or thought toward making Bukhaest, their capital city, a real capital nd not just one of the larger Balkan owns, cut to the severe design of the odern commercial city that is found hroughout the west. The whole hisry of the Roumanians since the castng off of the Turkish yoke has been ne of conservative progress leavened with enterprise, of thrift lightened by een appreciation of the embellishents and pleasures of life. And in lukharest one finds more artistic, literry and scientific life than in any other art of the peninsula.

"Bukharest is an attractive city of 00,000. It is laid out with many broad oulevards and avenues, as becomes a apital, and has, as Paris, Berlin and Washington, famous drives and parks within its area, an 'avenue of parades' nd zoological and botanical gardens. The city is built in a hollow between ne hills upon both sides of the Damborita river, which is crossed by twelve rnate bridges. There are some truly magnificent buildings upon its broad thoroughfares, among the most promient of which are the royal palace, the university, the national theater and the mince of justice. Bukharest has some qualid sections, with narrow, crooked streets, but these are reminiscences f the Turkish regime and are fast disappearing. While Bukharest does a usiderable commercial business, it is of no importance industrially.

"Bukharest, like our own capital, has been developed primarily as a capital The Roumanians have chosen Parts and Vienna as their models and have produced a judicious blending of the two upon the much smaller Balkan scale. Bukincest has plenty of good music, and its people, who gather in the concert halls or enjoy the free military concerts in the evening along ome promenade, are appreciative and critical listeners. The national theater brings varied offerings, and that the best. Then the entertainments of the little capital are discreet imitations of social Paris, with a touch of mild Viennese friendliness. Furthermore. Bukharest, as also becomes a European capital, is a great educational center. Its schools, academies, colleges and university are models for Balkan coun-
