SHEEPMAN IS KILLED.

LA PINE, Nov. 29.—Dan Angland,
one of Oregon's most prominent
sheepmen, who was stabbed in a sa-
loon at Paisley Thanksgiving night,
died there Sunday, after remaining
unconscious for two days. Jim O'-
Keefe, another sheepman, is held in
the Paisley jail on a charge of murder.
O'Keefe claims that Angland
followed him about all day Thursday
threatening trouble and that the
stabbing was in self-defense. Because
of the big following each man has
among the sheepmen of this section,
the affair has been kept quiet as
much as possible.
