RIGHT OF WAY BEING DONATED

LAKE COUNTY MEN ARE BUSY

First Right of Way Deed for O. C. & E. Signed by William Smock—Fifteen Miles are Pledged Already in Southern County.

(Lakeview Examiner.)

The committee appointed last week to take up the matter of securing the right of way out of Lakeview for the Oregon, California & Eastern railway is composed of E. C. Ahlstrom, F. M. Miller, D. J. Wilcox, H. M. Nolte and S. B. Chandler.

The proposition of securing the right of way was immediately taken up and those land owners who were present signified their intention of donating the right of way to the railroad. S. B. Chandler is one who is probably affected most by the right of way. The railroad will cross through about nine miles of his land in the Crooked Creek valley. He signified his intention of donating this right of way and stated at the time that he desired a station at the present Chandler station.

Others of the committee own land over which the right of way crosses and who signified their intention of donating it were D. J. Wilcox, E. C. Ahlstrom and the Nolte-Utley Realty Co., as representatives of the Hunter Land Co. The road will cross two tracts of D. J. Wilcox's, one of Mr. Ahlstrom's and nine belonging to the Hunter Land Co. The latter tracts lie just outside the city limits and extend north.

The committee designated certain of its members to see the different land owners along the right of way and get their attitude on the proposition of donating the necessary land. The committee is very optimistic over the outlook and look forward to very little trouble. In all there has been pledged about 15 miles of the right of way.

To Wm. Smock, a rancher about eight miles north of town, belongs the honor of being the first man signing the deeds for right of way. The road runs just a mile through his property. He came into Lakeview last week and signed the deeds.

The team debating at home will support the affirmative and the visiting team the negative of the question, Resolved: That the United States should adopt the essential features of the new military system.

The contestants in tomorrow's preliminaries are: North Pinesley, Howard Young, Alex Mansdorf, Sherman Smith, Esther Fox, Margaret Thompson, Tom Page and Floyd Reynolds.

The winners will each receive \$5 prizes offered by the First National Bank of Bend. The public is invited to attend the debate tryouts.

PLANS LAID FOR TRACK MEET AT REDMOND MAY 20

Stringent Rules Governing Eligibility of High School Contestants Adopted—Literary Program Arranged

At a meeting held at Redmond on Saturday and attended by representatives of the high schools of Bend, Prineville, Redmond and Madras, plans were laid for the annual track and field meet and declamatory contests to be held in Redmond Saturday, May 20, of next year.

The events of the field meet, which will include participants of both the public school grades and the high schools were fixed. The Redmond Commercial Club has agreed to have the track, field and tennis courts in first class condition for the occasion.

One of the most important steps taken by the conference was the adoption of eligibility rules and acceptance of the rules laid down by the Oregon high school association, which the leading high schools of the state are members. The most important features regarding eligibility of participants in the events were: barring all high school students over the age of 21 years, all post graduate students, and students who have been in a college or university; adoption of a four year rule whereby any student participating in high school track and field athletics will from then on be ineligible. Students will be prohibited from competing in the field meet if they enter subsequent to February 15. All competitors must be carrying four subjects and pacing in at least three of the four.

In the literary department the grade schools and public schools have been classified so that the grade school pupils will not be compelled to compete with the high school students. The grade schools have been classified in three sections. Section No. 1 includes the first, second and third grades; section No. 2, fourth, fifth and sixth, and section No. 3, seventh and eighth grades. There will be three divisions in the literary department for the oratorical, dramatic and humorous selections. The high schools will be permitted to enter contestants in two of these three divisions.

Prof. R. G. White represented the Bend high school at Saturday's meeting and will have charge of the track and field events.

BEND WILL HAVE COMMUNITY TREE

BIG COMMITTEE TO HAVE CHARGE

Churches to Be Asked to Co-operate in Presenting Programs on Christmas Eve at General Gathering—Needy Families to Be Helped.

There will be no disappointed children in Bend on Christmas morning. If the plans of a big committee to be appointed by Mrs. C. S. Hudson, who has general charge of the Community Christmas Tree to be held either on Christmas Eve or Christmas morning, materialize.

At an enthusiastic meeting held in the Commercial Club rooms Monday night a definite decision was reached to hold an outdoor Community Christmas tree, the time later to be decided. Mrs. C. S. Hudson was chosen general chairman and Mrs. A. M. Lara, secretary.

Owing to the preparations which have been commenced in many of the churches to hold their annual Christmas tree exercises, it was decided to confer with the pastors of the churches to ascertain whether they would be willing to consolidate their programs and to give them at the Community Christmas tree on Christmas Eve. Upon the decision of all the churches with regard to this plan hinges whether the Community Tree celebration will be held on Christmas Eve or the next morning. The suggestion has been made that the churches appoint a committee and that another committee work with them in adjusting two programs without interference. It is, however, the churches find that it is inadvisable to abandon their Christmas Eve exercises in their respective churches, the Community tree will probably be held on Christmas morning.

As to just what the character of the program for the Community tree shall be has not been decided. The most prominent suggestion made was to offer small gifts to every needy child, the selection of the needy ones to be made by a committee competent to judge. It is also planned to supply to all needy families a beautiful Christmas dinner and if the Community tree exercises are held on Christmas morning this work will probably be carried on in conjunction with it.

Another meeting will be held tomorrow night in the Commercial Club rooms when the nature of the program and the time the tree celebration will be held will assume a more definite shape.

WORK IN DARK; WRECK BRIDGES

Right of way runs, the ditch company having an easement only. When the logging road was begun, although the Brooks-Scanlon company felt that it had absolute right to cross the canals, formal permission to do so was asked of Mr. Howard in order to avoid any possible difficulty. Replying, Mr. Howard asked that the Bend Company give him certain rights over its land as a consideration for the grant to the Brooks-Scanlon company.

This was refused by The Bend Company and the Brooks-Scanlon Company returned to Mr. Howard a

deed covering the rights desired which had been executed by the C. O. I. Co. and sent to the Brooks-Scanlon Company for use in case The Bend Company made its grant.

C. O. I. Co. Once Satisfied.

According to this same official the C. O. I. Co. has never objected to the manner of construction of the bridges and was apparently satisfied with what had been done, as indicated by its sending the deed to be used in case it obtained what it wanted from The Bend Company. Furthermore, Engineer Redfield of the C. O. I. Co., actually approved the bridge plans.

Destruction of the bridges was affected under cover of darkness Sunday night and on Monday the canals, which had been dry for some time, were carrying more water than had been in them for months, making the replacement work difficult. On Monday also the C. O. I. Co. obtained a temporary injunction before Judge Duffy restraining the Brooks-Scanlon Company from replacing the bridges. Sheriff Knox came over on Tuesday but before he could make service of the papers the work was completed.

Mr. Howard spent a portion of the day in the neighborhood of the work, returning to Deschutes in the after-

noon. It is understood the matter will be further taken up in the courts.

COUNTY COURT SETS TAX LEVY

of the utilities is \$489,101.12, making the total taxable value for the county, \$8,041,996.12. According to the budget the amount to be raised for general fund purposes is \$164,458.82, which includes indebtedness of about \$46,000.

In addition to setting the county millage the court made levies for various school districts, which had failed to make them for themselves, the list being as follows: District 10, 5 mills; district 13, 5 mills; district 15, 5 mills; district 20, two mills; district 22, 5 mills; district 25, 1 mill; district 26, 2 mills; district 29, 1 mill; district 35, 2 mills; Redmond Union high school, 2 mills.

Voting Precincts Fixed.

Other business of general county interest attended to by the court last week was the fixing of the boundaries of the voting precincts, including the establishment of new precincts

and changing the boundaries of old ones.

The city of Bend is divided into three precincts, Bend precinct, No. 1 including the section bounded by the river, California street, Cascade street, the Oregon Trunk tracks and the north line of North addition, No. 4 being bounded by the river, Alder street, the tracks, Cascade street and California street, and No. 5 being all other parts of the city.

Deschutes precinct is broken up the territory west of the river becoming Kenwood precinct and that on the east side remaining as Deschutes. Other precincts affected in the county are Montgomery, McKay, Lower Bridge, Roberts, Johnson Creek, Mill Creek, Howard, Bear Creek, Camp Creek, Powell Butte, Alfalfa, Imperial, Hillman and Hat Rock.

Road Money Set Aside.

A definite appropriation by the court of \$10,000 for the use of the state under the direction of the state highway engineer to be spent on the highways of the county assures the expenditure of a like amount by the state, making a total of \$20,000.

According to the plans of the state highway engineer the money will be spent on the Crater Creek road south of Bend.
