

# ERSKINE NAMED LOCAL DEPUTY

## APPOINTMENT MADE BY WIRTZ

Growth of Bend Creates Necessity for Office Here—Will Have Charge of Enforcement of "Dry" Law in This Section—Other Duties.

Chas. W. Erskine, of Bend, has been named by District Attorney Wirtz as regular deputy district attorney for Crook county. In announcing the appointment Mr. Wirtz calls attention to the growth of the town and the increase in business here which makes a deputy necessary here.

On coming to Bend over two years ago Mr. Erskine was associated with Vernon A. Forbes in his law office, later devoting his attention to the business of the Bend Insurance Agency. He was calendar clerk of the house at the last session of the legislature.

In announcing the appointment Mr. Wirtz says:

"While I have been importuned upon various occasions by different citizens of Bend to name a deputy in that city, it is not until recently that I have deemed it necessary to make such an appointment.

"The recently renewed activity of an industrial character at Bend has made that city a Mecca for not only earnest, law-abiding workmen with families, but it is also attracting a great many strangers of less desirability. A great many of them will be disappointed in finding an occupation of a profitable nature, as there will not be work for all who are coming, and then, there are some who no doubt are coming to Bend not to work, but to live off those who do work, by questionable vocations, or to be in a place where there is activity and industry, in contrast with so many other communities in the State of Oregon at this time, all of which will make the task of enforcing the law difficult, especially after the first of the new year when the prohibition amendment goes into effect.

"It will be Mr. Erskine's duty under the appointment, especially to enforce the so-called 'dry law.' However, he will also be called upon to hold preliminarys at Bend and attend to the great many petty disturbances that are bound to arise during the winter months contemplated because of the conditions noted above. It is clearly impossible for all these matters to receive my personal attention. The courts at Prineville, as also the duty of advising the county officials, which requires constant attention there, keep the district attorney's time quite well occupied, and in addition there are now two cases in the supreme court of a public nature requiring additional time and particular concentration.

"The enforcement of prohibition rests particularly heavy upon the district attorney and his responsibilities under the law enacted to execute the constitution amendment are great."

Mr. Erskine and District Attorney Wirtz were students at Willamette University at the same time.

## Sign Board Advertising is Big Magnet For Go to Church Sunday

### Rev. H. C. Hartranft Evolves Novel But Dignified Publicity Plan to "Get Next to the People"—Results Realized---Varied Program Arranged

Following closely upon the heels of many of the leading clergymen of the East and middle West, who are attempting to increase the number of church going people through ingenious methods of advertising, Rev. H. C. Hartranft, of the Presbyterian church, has evolved a novel idea of augmenting the ranks of "go to church Sunday" people.

Boldly standing out on a huge sign board at the corner of Wall and Oregon streets, the passerby may be attracted by several colored signs that may be read at a distance of several hundred feet, which reads as follows:

Where the business man advertises "to get the business," Rev. Hartranft is advertising with the sole view of "getting the crowds." He says that he is getting them. Since this method of getting next to the reading public

has been adopted, Rev. Hartranft says that the attendance at the Presbyterian church has increased between 10 and 20 per cent. He attributes the increase to the methods he is using.

It is hardly possible for any observing person passing the sign board to miss it. It stands out prominently as a circus advertisement, yet it is dignified and observes the rules and ethics of legitimate advertising.

"The prime reason for adopting this course," says Rev. Hartranft is to get next to the public. Some people think church matters should be treated very differently before the public than business. I disagree. If a sermon is worth delivering, it is worth coming right out in big bold letters before the public. What is better, more attractive and productive of better results than advertising.

"The big complaint against the church today, and a public indictment which I believe in a measure is justifiable, is that the church has been drifting away from the people. It is to be our work to 'get next' so to speak, and get the people in the habit of going to church on Sunday. That is why we shall attempt to have a varied program out his occasion, with something to interest everybody."
