

BEND TO BE A MR. GOODFELLOW

FEATURES PLANNED FOR CHRISTMAS

Community Tree Program to Be Held on Evening of December 24—Every Child in Town to Receive Presents — Churches Co-operate.

Bend is going to be a Mr. Goodfellow on Christmas Day. Goodfellowship is to express itself in many ways.

A Christmas tree with all the holiday festivities that should accompany such a feature, Christmas dinners for those whose means are not sufficient to provide them, clothing and other necessities for the needy, and a hearty yuletide spirit, will combine to make the 1915 Christmas for Bend the biggest and best that the town has ever experienced.

The people of the town have taken to the idea with unexpected keenness and with a determination to make the Community Christmas a success which will assure it a permanent place in the calendar for years to come.

Not to be outdone by larger towns and cities of the northwest, Bend will have a Christmas commensurate with any other that will observe the holiday season in a similar manner.

The Community Christmas Tree, to be an entirely democratic celebration, will be held on Christmas eve, the program to be held on the lawn at the northwest corner of Wall and Ohio streets beginning promptly at 8:30 o'clock. The date was definitely decided on at a meeting of the committees in charge held Thursday night. It was the expression of all the pastors of the Bend churches that they were desirous of co-operating in every way to make the affair a success, and for that reason determined to change the hour of holding their programs so that their churches could participate in the general community exercises. To conform with the plan laid down by the Community Christmas Tree committee the churches will all hold their programs early in the evening to assure their completion before 8:30 o'clock. A plan is being evolved by which a select program will be arranged, including a part of the program given at the churches, to be given at the Community Tree. Othomusic by local talent is also being arranged.

Great pains will be taken by the committee on decoration to make the tree to be selected as beautiful as possible. It will be brilliantly decorated and electric lighted, the electrical effects to be prepared by the Bend Water Light & Power Company. Plans are being carefully made to accommodate several hundred children who will be recipients of presents, all of which will be uniform. A careful canvass of the town to be made by competent persons, to get the names of every child in Bend so that no child will be overlooked on the occasion of giving out presents.

Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus have been selected, but their identity is to be kept secret until the evening of the Community Tree.

MANY MAY SEEK IMPORTANT JOB

PUBLIC SERVICE POST IS OPEN

Seven Republicans Are in Receptive Mood for \$4,000 Place Which is Available Only to Eastern Oregonians — Who They Are.

The big opportunity for the east-of-the-mountains office seeker comes at the next election. A place on the State Public Service Commission, previously known as the Railroad Commission, is open next November, and under the law passed by the last legislature the vacancy next occurring must be filled by a man from the eastern Oregon district.

The job pays \$4,000 a year, and is important and interesting. That it will be sought by a goodly number of eastern Oregonians is already apparent. At least seven Republican candidates are already mentioned, but thus far no Democrats have come forward.

Among the Republican candidates, avowed and receptive are the following:

H. H. Corey, of Baker. He has been clerk of the Commission for four years at \$2,000. He has not held other public office and is not very widely known in the district, although considered an able office man.

Ed Wright of Union county. At present county clerk, to which position he has been re-elected continuously. Is credited with a strong following, and is efficient and popular and well known.

Jerry P. Rusk of Union. Was speaker of the House in 1911. In 1912 was an out-and-out Progressive and is said last year to have worked hard for Hanley. Is widely known.

J. M. Kyle, mayor of Stanfield, Umatilla county. Formerly lived at Salem. In 1906 he was associated with the campaign of Jonathan Bourne, but later left the Bourne standard. Has many influential friends.

J. T. Mahoney of Morrow county. Has been a member of the legislature. Has local following and is said to be in a receptive mood.

John W. McCulloch of Ontario Malheur county. In 1899 was a legislative member from Marion county. Has been district attorney for Malheur for eight years. A substantial candidate.

Frank Davey of Burns. Was speaker of the House in 1907. Conducted Harney County News and prominent in Harney Republican activities. At present on the Penitentiary staff at Salem. Mentioned by his friends as a possible candidate.

All three of the present members of the Commission are Republicans. B. Campbell and Clyde B. Aitchison finish their terms January 4, 1917. Frank J. Miller holds office until 1919.

THE JONES BILL

Text of Measure Now Pending For the Assistance of Irrigation

Be It Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the declared purpose of this Act is to encourage the reclamation of lands under laws enacted to that end by the several States, and to provide for the co-operation of the United States in aid thereof.

Sec. 2. That whenever any district duly organized under the laws of any State, having for its purpose the irrigating, draining, or diking of lands within the district, and being authorized by law to issue its bonds to procure funds for the carrying out of the purpose of its organization, shall desire the co-operation and aid of the United States, it shall file with the Secretary of the Interior plans and estimates of the work proposed to be done for the reclamation of district lands, and shall make application to have such plans and estimates examined and approved. The Secretary of the Interior thereupon shall cause an examination to be made of the plans and the district project, and, if the same shall be deemed feasible, or shall be so modified as to be feasible, the Secretary of the Interior may, on behalf of the United States, guarantee the interest on bonds to be issued by said district for the purposes aforesaid.

Sec. 3. That the district bonds to be guaranteed as hereinbefore provided shall run for a period not to exceed forty years, and the interest to be guaranteed shall not exceed four per centum per annum, and with these limitations each State may prescribe the time and manner of the payment of the bonds of its districts. The guaranty upon all bonds shall be
