COMMUNITY TREE PLANS COMPLETE

PROGRAM TO BEGIN AT 8:30 O'CLOCK

Beautiful Tree to Be Illuminated With Many Colored Lights is Selected—Gifts to Go to More Than Six Hundred Children.

A Merry Christmas. A Christmas replete with showers of yule-tide spirit are forecasted on Christmas Eve, on the occasion of Bend's first Community Christmas tree. The showers are expected to begin promptly at 8:30 o'clock. There will not be a Bend home without Christmas cheer or a Santa Claus on Christmas morning, as the plans of the large committee in charge of the Community Tree include gifts for every child in town. To make this Christmas a memorable one, especially for the children, is the end toward which this committee has been working unceasingly for the last two weeks.

Many to Get Gifts. Ample provision has been made to give Christmas cheer to more than 600 children on Christmas Eve when every child will be given a bag of candy and a stocking full of toys to take home. Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus will have charge of the distribution and no child will be overlooked. Special efforts will be made to allot each child his gifts in the smallest possible space of time.

A large Christmas tree on the vacant lot adjoining the office of the Brooks-Scanlon Company on Wall street has been selected to receive the gaudy dress. Through the courtesy of the Bend Water Light & Power Company the tree will be beautifully illuminated with many colored electric lights and trimmed with ornaments becoming to the occasion. Nothing is being spared to have this feature of the exercises arranged in the best possible shape.

Churches to Dismiss Early. The churches, which will hold their Christmas Eve exercises before the Community Tree program begins, will make a special effort to dismiss their audiences in time to enable the exercises to begin promptly at 8:30 o'clock.

All day last Saturday a large number of ladies on the committee were busy making bags for the candy, and this week are filling them with sweet treats.

PUNCH-BOARDS FORBIDDEN

District Attorney Wirtz Says They are Gambling Devices.

(Creek County Journal.) District Attorney Wirtz and Sheriff Knox are calling upon the local authorities in the incorporated towns in Crook county to suppress the so-called "punch-boards" as being in violation of the gambling ordinances. If the request of the county authorities is not heeded prosecutions of those operating such boards or similar drawing and lottery schemes will be prosecuted in the state courts. The reason for calling upon the local authorities first is that the evil can be handled much more effectively and just as adequately without great expense, probably without expense at all, in the municipal or recorder's courts while the procedure in the state courts is much more cumbersome, slower and of expense to the taxpayers at large.
