

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

December Term, 1915.

Court convened this twenty-seventh day of December, 1915, at the hour of ten o'clock in the morning; when were present the following officers: J. F. Blanchard, president, H. J. Overturf, Commissioner, Warren Brown, County Clerk, E. H. Knox, Sheriff.

Whereupon the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of the organization of the Okeechiee Irrigation District: On petition of F. Fred Hoescher and others, order made by Court granting said petition, declaring the boundaries of said irrigation district, the regularity of all proceedings and directing that five directors be elected for said district.

The Court further ordered an election to be held in said proposed irrigation district on the 5th day of February, 1916, and that notice thereof be given as required by law, and appointing judges therefor.

M. R. Higgs, attorney for himself and others, entered objections in open Court to the proceedings of the Court in this matter, and to the signing of the above mentioned orders and gave notice of an appeal. Court adjourned for the term.

January Term, 1916.

Be It Remembered a regular term of the County Court of the State of Oregon for the county of Crook, was begun and held in the court house in Prineville, Oregon on Wednesday, the 6th day of January, 1916, the same being the first Wednesday in said month and the time affixed by law for holding a regular term of said Court, when were present at the hour of ten o'clock in the morning the following officers: G. Springer, Judge, presiding, J. F. Blanchard, Commissioner, Warren Brown, Clerk, E. H. Knox, Sheriff.

Whereupon the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

Order warrant in the sum of \$25 drawn in favor of Thomas M. Anderson Camp for the care of an indigent soldier; \$20 of said amount to be for merchandise furnished by T. R. McClincy, \$5 for cash furnished by John B. Bell, and \$10 for relief for month of January, 1916.

County road matters. The following road matters were continued until the first day of the regular March term: Preliminary hearings on the Tumalo Project No.

1, and S. V. Hardin No. 2, proposed county roads. Final hearing on the C. H. Dealy proposed county road.

Order warrant in the sum of \$500 drawn in favor of John Tuck for use on the Prineville-Redmond county road.

Petition for county road presented by Walter A. Foster, et al, bond approved in the sum of \$200, opinion filed by District Attorney approving proceedings. Viewers ordered out on day of —, 1916.

Widow's pension. Order granting widow's pension to Emma J. Marion in the sum of \$25 per month.

Indigent. Order warrant drawn in favor of Statira Biggs in sum of \$15 for use of certain indigents.

Tubercular cattle. It appearing to the court that certain affidavits in the matter of the indemnity claimed by J. J. Ellinger for tubercular cattle slaughtered under the 1913 law have been lost, ordered that when like affidavits have been filed with the Clerk and approved by the District Attorney the said Clerk shall issue a warrant to the said J. J. Ellinger in the sum of \$12.50 and shall enter order granting indemnity in the sum of \$25 for one cow slaughtered.

Court convened this sixth day of January, 1916, at the hour of nine o'clock in the morning; same officers present as yesterday.

County roads. Viewers report read for the first time in the change in the Irwin D. Husey road, and the Evinson Atkinson road.

Court adjourned for the day to meet with the Jefferson county court in Culver, Oregon.

Court convened this seventh day of January, 1916, at the hour of nine o'clock in the morning. Same officers present as yesterday.

Gage in Squaw Creek. The matter of installing a recording gage in Squaw Creek at the site of the present government gage, continued until first day of March term.

Water master. Order office of water master reinstated in Crook county at a salary of \$100 per month, beginning January 6th, 1916.

County roads. Preliminary hearing coming on in the Chas. A. Sherman road, evidence before the court of proper notice to property owners, and no objections appearing; order Surveyor to make final survey and report at the first day of the regular March term, next.

Viewer's report read for a second time in the change in Irwin D. Husey road and approved, order road opened as a public highway as soon as funds are available.

Viewer's report read for a second time in the Evinson Atkinson road, and approved. Order road opened as a public highway as soon as funds are available.

Preliminary hearing coming on in the matter of the O. F. Wallenburg

road, appearing that a change should be made in location of present survey. Surveyor ordered to make final survey locating road 20 feet east of original description, and report at regular March term.

Resolution adopted recommending the establishment of the extension of the Elliott road and directing the Surveyor to make a preliminary report on the same forthwith. Preliminary report of surveyor filed at this time. Order setting Wednesday, the first day of March, 1916, at the hour of 10 o'clock in the morning as the time of hearing on said preliminary report and directing that proper notice thereof be given to property owners.

Payment for light. Court agrees to accept the sum of \$50 from F. H. Gloyd as payment in full to the county for all light used by Mr. Gloyd at the county court house, and directs said amount to be paid to the Treasurer.

Payment to school districts. Court orders that warrants be drawn in the amounts shown to be due and owing by Crook county by the report of Crandall and Roberts as follows: to the City of Madras, \$78.34; to Madras Union High, \$38.31; to Madras school district No. 22, \$2092.92.

Crook County Journal. Upon sworn statements of their circulation submitted by newspapers in Crook county, the circulation of the Crook county Journal found to be the highest, and it is hereby designated the official paper for the county of Crook, state of Oregon.

Contract. The Crook County Journal agrees to print the proceedings of the County Court and all legal notices of a like character to those published under its contract with the county for 1915, for the year beginning January 1st, 1916, for the sum of \$250; the Court agreeing to furnish the paper with all copies for publication. The Bend Bulletin agrees to publish all the proceedings and notices aforesaid for the sum of \$150 for the year of 1916 the Court furnishing all copies for publication.

Contract. The Crook County Journal agrees to publish the delinquent tax list for Crook county as required by law, at the rate of five cents per line; and the said Crook County Journal further agrees to have said delinquent tax list published in The Bend Bulletin in full.

Error in tax receipt. An error appearing on tax receipt No. 252 for 1911, order warrant drawn in favor of E. A. Smith in the sum of \$7.30.

Court convened this 8th day of January at the hour of nine o'clock in the morning. Same officers present as yesterday.

County road. Resolution adopted recommending the Geo. W. Roberts change in the Winzer county road,

and directing the Surveyor to make a preliminary report forthwith. Preliminary report of Surveyor filed at this time. Order setting Wednesday, the first day of March, 1916, at the hour of 10 o'clock in the morning as the time of hearing on said preliminary report.

Indigents. At the request of Commissioner Overturf, Judge Springer is hereby directed to investigate personally the condition of certain indigents in the City of Bend.

Road work. Order warrants drawn in favor of Commissioner Blanchard and Commissioner Overturf, each in the sum of \$500, to be used for work on County roads.

Sheriff. Order warrant drawn in the sum of \$100 in favor of E. B. Knox, Sheriff for official use for postage, etc.

Court adjourned this eighth day of January, 1916, to meet in regular adjourned session on Thursday, the 20th day of January, 1916, at the hour of 10 o'clock in the morning.

MR. FINLEY SUGGESTS PROPER WAY FOR FEEDING BIRDS.

Provision for Songsters Should Be in Sheltered Place or Spot From Which Snow Has Been Cleared.

Don't throw the food that is meant to keep winter birds from starving into the snow. Either sweep off the window sill or clear a place in some sheltered part of the garden where the birds will have no difficulty in obtaining the food. This is the advice of William L. Finley, state biologist and one of the best informed men on birdlore in the country. He says:

"The winter robin, or mountain robin, as well as the Western robin, commonly called 'red breast,' prefers fruit and worms to all other food. Since the worms are not available fruit and particularly apples will prove attractive.

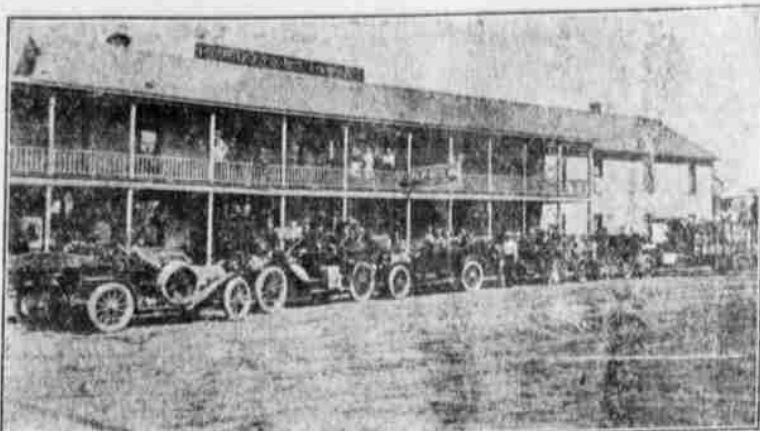
"Feed the snowbirds, or Oregon juncos, bird seed, crumbs or other things of that kind. The snowbirds have black heads, white bills, and can

easily be identified when they fly, for they have two white tail feathers. "The song sparrow is a plain brown bird with a light stripe over the eye. His breast is whitish in color and covered with brown spots, one large brown spot being in the center of the breast. Sparrows are fond of crumbs and bird seed, nuts and bits of suet.

"The chickadee, which depends on insect eggs mostly for food, can be seen hanging from branches of trees and bushes, looking for insects on the under side of the branches. When

he cannot find insect eggs he is attracted by bits of beef suet that can be tied to the branches of trees or bushes."
