

RESULTS OF RABBIT CAMPAIGN By R. A. WARD

Owing to the fact that I have to lecture at the Oregon Agricultural College this week I will be unable to answer inquiries concerning poisoning until my return on January 13. After that date I will be pleased to assist the various poisoning organizations in any way possible and will appreciate the hearty co-operation of the interested in making the Crook county poisoning project a success. Earlier in the campaign the organizations were advised that as soon as results of the poisoning experiments at present in progress were available such information would be given to them. While no conclusions have been reached concerning the experiments conducted by my assistant in Lake county the following facts are worthy of mention and I recommend their use by those actively engaged in rabbit poisoning.

It appears that the absence of saccharine will not affect materially the success of the poison. Equally as good results have been obtained the past week without its use. Instead a tea cup level full of table salt dissolved in the pint of water before making the starch gives promise of increasing the effectiveness of the poison.

The number of quarts of oats used to each ounce of strychnine may be increased from 12 to 14 quarts without decreasing the efficiency of the poison. It will also tend to make the preparation cheaper. The alfalfa mixture has given equally as good results as the poison oats during the past month in Lake county. It is also slightly cheaper to use. The organizations on the high desert still

report good kills and it appears that weather conditions are more favorable for poisoning in that locality.

Mr. F. E. Garlough who is assisting me in the Lake county experiments has averaged 90 jack rabbits a night during the past ten days by the use of a small portion of grain and poison alfalfa. This is due to the fact that the rabbits, their habits and natural food conditions, are being carefully studied. The hay in the bait corrals is changed every few days and as fast as it is eaten down a fresh fork full is put out. Poisons are switched every 3 or 4 days, that is, the oats are used in a corral which has been used for poisoned alfalfa and the poisoned alfalfa is exposed where the poisoned grain has been used. The poison is put out fresh every evening and that which has been in the corral for 2 days is removed. It is worthy of comment that on the nights when the poisons are switched the largest kills are made.

WOMAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Homesteader Takes Poison During Absence of Daughter.

(Crook County Journal.)

Mrs. Emma C. Streeter, a widow, who lived with her two daughters in a lonely cabin about forty miles east

of Millican in the Hampton Butte country, committed suicide Friday night or Saturday morning by taking a quantity of strychnine.

Coroner Poladexter and Dr. Edwards were called to the scene and held an inquest. They found that Mrs. Streeter was left alone by her daughters who had gone to a New Year dance and upon returning the

following day they found the mother dead in her bed, with a quantity of strychnine in a bottle and a cup of water near the bed.

Because of the fact that there had been some of the poison used it was impossible to tell just how much she had taken. She had been dead for some hours before the tragedy was discovered. She was 55 years of age.



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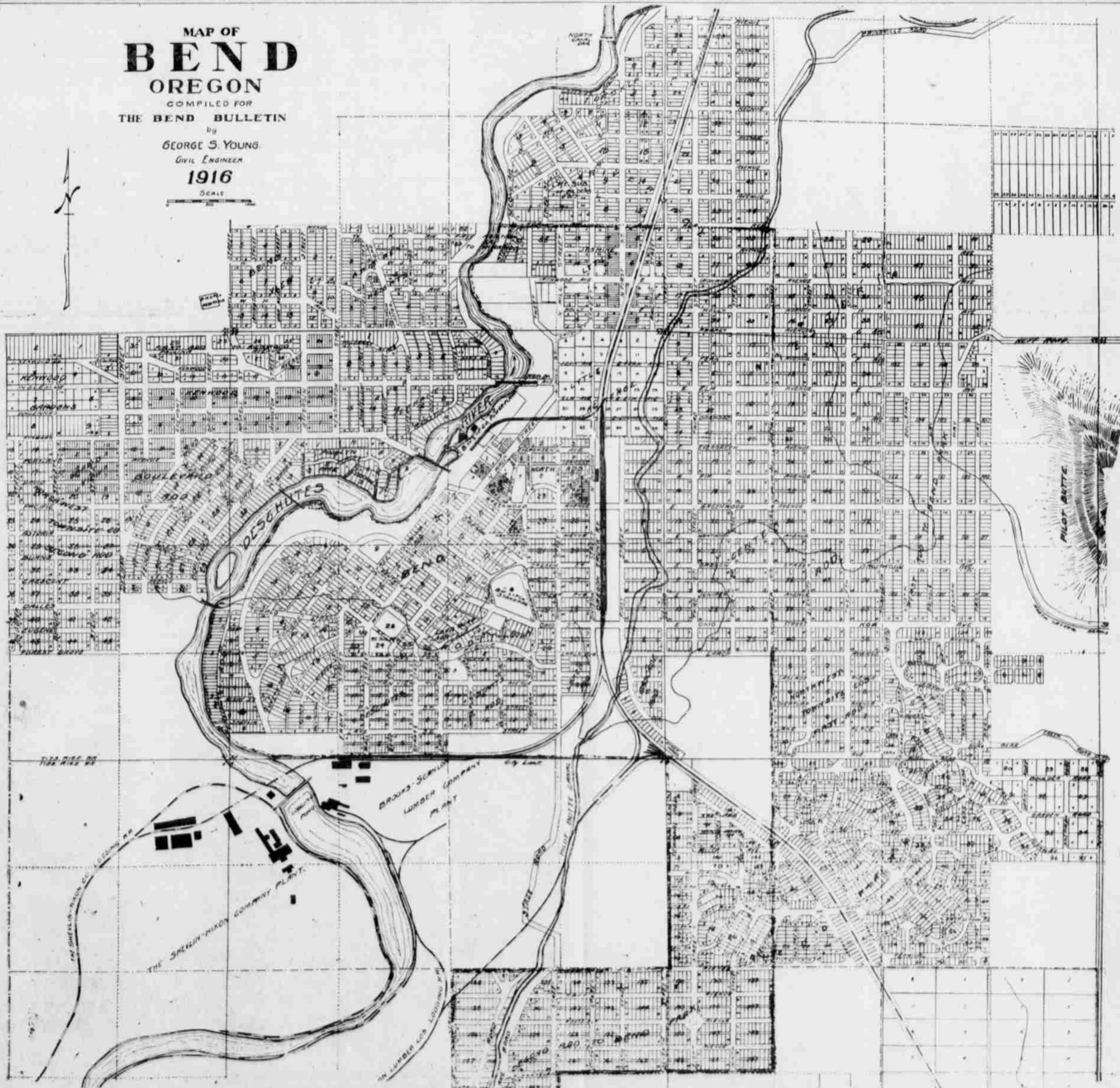
MAP OF BEND OREGON
