SCHOOL BENEFIT.

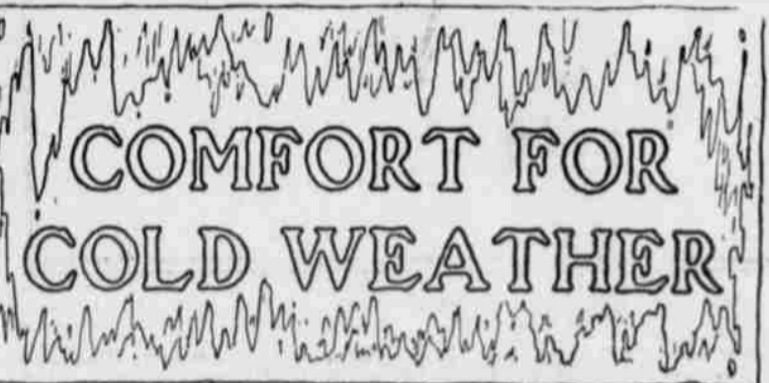
