England's First Scientist. The first great English scientist was Roger Bacon, who died in 1294. The exact date of his birth is unknown, but it is believed that this year marks the seven hundredth anniversary. He was persecuted and condemned and much of his work destroyed, so that the extent of his discoveries cannot be delinitely known. It is certain that he was centuries ahead of his ignorant and credulous times in chemistry, mechanks and mathematics. Branded as a mugician, he was thrown into prison. From 1277 until a short time before his death Bacon was immured in a filthy cell. 


