OLDEST AMERICAN STATUE.

Found Near Vera Cruz, It Was Made

Over Twenty Centuries Ago. small stone statue found near Vern Cruz, Mexico, which has been in the possession of the United States National museum since 1903, has been identified as the oldest known dated antiquity in America. Its ancient Mayan glyphic inscriptions show that it was made 100 years before Christ, which is the oldest date authenticated in the new world.

This un was image was found in 1902 near the gulf of Mexico, 100 miles southeast of Vera Cruz, and come to the museum through R E Ulbricht the next year it is of hard grayish green stone, carved into a rounded onical form, six and one-half inches high and three and three-fourths inches in diameter.

The upper part represents a human head with well defined features. The lower part of the face is covered with a mask, resembling the bill of a duck, carved in relief and extending down over the chest like a beard. The bird like form is further emphasized by the wings, covering the sides of the figure. Beneath the wings the outlines of a bird's feet and legs are engraved. -New York Times.
