**AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT THE
 SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS
 WITHIN THE CITY OF BEND,
 PROVIDING A PENALTY
 FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF
 AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.**

Be It Ordained by the Common Coun-
 cil of the City of Bend:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful
 for any person, firm or corporation,
 club or associations of persons, from
 and after the date of the passage
 hereof and its approval by the May-
 or, to sell, offer to sell, give away or
 offer to give away any intoxicating
 liquor or liquors within the city of
 Bend, Oregon, provided, however,
 that the provisions of this ordinance
 shall not prohibit the sale of intoxi-
 cating liquor within the city of Bend
 by any persons permitted to sell in-
 toxicating liquors by Chapter 141,
 General Laws of Oregon, for 1915,
 in the manner and under the condi-
 tions specified in said Chapter 141,
 it being the intention of this ordi-
 nance to conform to said State law
 with reference to the sale of intoxi-
 cating liquors; and provided further,
 that the term giving away as herein

used shall mean when any person
 shall give away or offer to give away
 any intoxicating liquors for the pur-
 pose of evading the provisions of
 this ordinance or of the laws of the
 State of Oregon.

Section 2. Whenever any police
 officer of the City of Bend shall have
 good reason to believe that any per-
 son, firm or corporation is keeping
 intoxicating liquor in any building
 within the City of Bend for the pur-
 pose of evading this ordinance or the
 laws of the State of Oregon, such
 police officer is hereby authorized
 and empowered to enter and search
 such building or buildings, without
 search warrant, and if he shall find
 any liquors, of which the sale thereof
 is prohibited by this ordinance, he
 shall arrest the person or persons
 having such liquor in storage. Any
 person violating this section shall up-
 on conviction be subject to a fine
 not to exceed \$50 or imprisonment
 in the city jail not to exceed 30 days,
 or by both such fine and imprison-
 ment.

Section 3. Any person, firm or
 corporation violating the provisions
 of this ordinance shall be deemed
 guilty of a misdemeanor and upon
 conviction shall be punished by a
 fine not to exceed \$50 or by impris-
 onment in the city jail not to exceed
 30 days or by both such fine and im-
 prisonment.

Section 4. WHEREAS the pas-
 sage of this ordinance is necessary
 for the immediate preservation of
 the public health and public safety,
 and an emergency is hereby declar-
 ed to exist and this ordinance shall
 be in full force and effect immedi-
 ately upon its passage by the council
 and its approval by the Mayor.
