

## PAISLEY PEOPLE CONSIDER RAISING FUNDS FOR ROAD

The Cheapest of Three Surveys by the Town is One Mile East—Difference of \$10,000 Exists.

(Chevaucan Press.)  
Mr. F. L. Young received a letter from Robert E. Strahorn last Tuesday in which the railroad builder stated that he had received the engineer's final estimates upon the various surveys which were made past Paisley and that in his opinion the one farthest east was the logical one to build. He stated that the one passing through town was out of the question because of the greater expense and that the center one could be built but it would cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000 more than the one farthest east.

The cheapest line passes about one mile east of Paisley while the second best is only about half that distance.

A meeting was called Wednesday afternoon at the Paisley National Bank to discuss the matter and practically all the business men of town and other property owners were present. At that time it was decided to write Mr. Strahorn further and ascertain what amount of the \$10,000 Paisley would be expected to raise to secure a road on the central survey and also what amount it would take to secure it on the survey running through Paisley.

As soon as these questions are answered another meeting will be held at which time some definite action will be taken in the matter.
