Will Have Local Sales Agency for Shevlin-Hixon Company.

H. A. Miller will have the exclusive local sales agency for The Shevlin-Hixon Company, according to an announcement made by T. A. McCann, superintendent of the company yesterday. An arrangement to this effect has been concluded by Mr. Miller and Mr. McCann in the past few days.

Mr. Miller's plans are to start a yard on Wall street on the railroad spur where he will assemble a stock as fast as possible after the Shevlin mill begins operation. He was formerly in the same business here under the name of Miller Lumber Co., selling out his yard last fall to The Bend Company. 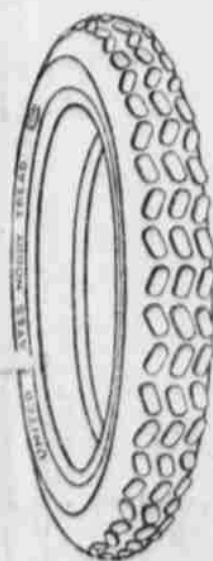
