

WELL EQUIPPED HOSPITAL PROVIDED FOR EMPLOYEES

Both Mill Companies Have Contract With Local Physicians for Medical and Surgical Attention.

Both the Shevlin-Hixon and the Brooks-Seaton companies have provided for medical, surgical and hospital attention for their men in the same thorough way that has characterized their operations in general. No detail which has to do with the health or safety of their employees has been overlooked.

Both companies have entered into a contract with Doctors Coe and Ferrell to furnish hospital accommodations and surgical attention to those of their employees who may be in need of it.

Each employee of the companies pays a monthly hospital fee of \$1.00, which entitles him to medical treatment of any kind and hospital care when needed. This plan makes it possible to maintain a well-equipped, comfortable hospital with ideal location and surroundings. The hospital is owned by Doctors Coe and Ferrell and though it is a private hospital and was opened primarily to take care of the mill employees, private cases are accepted. The hospital, however, is not intended to be a money-making institution and its existence is entirely due to the necessity of taking care of the mill employees and is made possible by their monthly contribution.

Each lumber camp of the two companies is provided with a medicine chest containing such drugs and medicines as can be used without the direct supervision of a physician. Each chest has a supply of surgical dressings, bandages, cotton and everything necessary for first aid work in case of injury. Each camp and mill has its stretcher provided and when an employee is injured, he can be put on a stretcher and taken directly to the hospital. Later on it is the intention to give foremen, timekeepers and the head men in all departments of the mill and logging camps instructions regarding first aid to the injured.

COE APPOINTED ON BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS

Bend Physician Selected by Governor Withycombe is Only Member Not Portland Resident.

SALEM, March 21.—Dr. U. C. Coe, of Bend, was today appointed by Governor Withycombe a member of the Oregon State Board of Medical Examiners, succeeding Dr. Henderson of Astoria. Dr. Coe is the representative of the eclectic school of medicine on the board.

The new appointee is a graduate of the Eclectic Medical College of Cincinnati, the largest institution of the kind in the country and is a member of the National Eclectic Medical Association. He is also a graduate of the University of Missouri and has done post-graduate work in New York.

It is known that Dr. Coe received much endorsement for this position

from Portland physicians. He is the only member of the board who is not a resident of Portland.

powerhouse to box factory. He can tell you the dimension of every building without consulting a plan. He can tell you the capacity of every machine, the horsepower of every motor and engine. He can tell you anything you want to know about a sawmill.

A man with a multitude of details upon his mind from the time he rises until he retires, Mr. Dion is always willing and apparently anxious to describe any of the details of the plant to the uneducated layman. He can do this and at the same time carry on the detail work of a builder without apparent interruption.

Mill Building is a Profession.

He is a self trained man. He is not a college bred construction engineer. He has learned his profession, for that is what he considers sawmill building, from hand to hand touch with the industry. He admits that his education, so far as books and college degrees is concerned, is practically nil. Sawmill building came to be a profession by acquiring the knowledge from the ground up. He began at the bottom, but after only three years of working under another he began building mills for himself, associating early with Fred Horskotte, an expert draftsman. The firm of Dion & Horskotte build sawmills and auxiliary sawmill plants from the foundation to the roof, everything complete.
