

REGISTRATION COMES SLOWLY

1411 VOTERS ENROLLED FOR PRIMARY

Republicans Are in Lead—Prineville 429 Eligibles—Women Show But Little Interest in Primaries. Books Close April 18.

(Crook County Journal.)

The registration of 1411 voters was completed according to the returns from outside precincts and those registered at the court house in this city, up to the hour of closing last Saturday night.

Some of the outlying precincts have sent in no names as yet, while some of the precincts have reported a heavy registration.

Prineville with 424 has a small lead in the total registration, with Bend a close second with 429, Redmond having 145, Sisters 79 and Tumalo 64. More than 75 per cent of the registration to date is masculine, the exact number being 1086, the fair voters being but 325 in number, of which amount 126 are registered in Prineville alone.

The division of the voters between the parties is almost a two to one republican faith, 812 of the G. O. P. voters having registered, and only 437 democrats.

There seems to be less socialists and scattering voters this year than formerly. Less than a score have registered at any rate. The B. H. Moose party comes to the front with six members in the county to date, practically all of whom live in Bend. Less than half a dozen prohibitionists have registered.

The registration of women voters in Bend is noticeably light, less than 50 of them having registered up to last Saturday.

As compared to the registration before the primaries two years ago it seems that almost one half of those who will probably register before that time have already done so.

Only 3938 voters were registered at that date in 1914, and while there has been considerable increase in the voting strength, especially at Bend, it is not likely that this will more than offset the loss of the Jefferson county vote.

More than 5,000 people, 5,614 to be exact, were registered before the general election in 1914.

The registration books will close on April 18, and remain closed until after the primaries.

SURVEYING CONTINUES ON PROPOSED ROAD TO BEND

Engineers Now Making Survey Southeast to Connect with Klamath Falls Lines—Country to Benefit.

(Silver Lake Leader.)

It is with a feeling of the greatest satisfaction that we have one of the large crews of the Strahorn O. C. & E. railroad engineers in our midst. And the fact that they are making their surveys directly through the town of Silver Lake of course immensely pleases the citizens and property owners here.

While this means a stupendous thing for our town, it means greatly more for the Silver Lake valley and its residents. Our prayers of the past twenty years are now being answered, and it is an answer, too, for Mr. Strahorn has never been known to handle a hot-air proposition.

The engineers are now making the survey from Silver Lake southwest to the railroad connection with Klamath Falls. This line will run through the midst of a heavy timber belt between this place and Klamath Falls. From Silver Lake north toward Bend the road will pass through the communities which will soon be irrigated under the system of Units known as the Silver Lake Irrigation project, all of which means a great tonnage for the new railroad system.

The town of Silver Lake, at the junction point of the two lines, will be in the midst of a highly cultivated irrigated district and is sure to become a place of importance.

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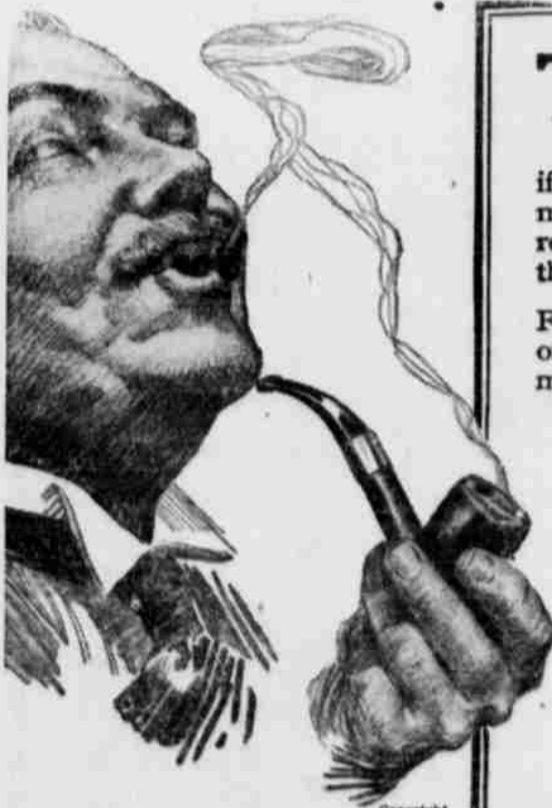
