

COUNCIL HOLDS APRIL MEETING

OCTOBER WARRANTS TO BE PAID

Dr. Coe Discusses City Health Conditions—New Ordinance to be Proposed Covering Garbage Collection—To Arrange for Bonds.

In a long drawn out session last night the city council transacted routine business and discussed city health conditions and the matter of the resubmission of the Strahorn bond issue.

In his capacity as city physician Dr. C. C. Coe attended the meeting and advised the council what steps should be taken to preserve the health of the city, laying especial stress on the importance of a sanitary campaign and the need of frequent cleaning up of fly breeding places. In this connection Mayor Kester suggested that the city employ a garbage collector and obtain a regular dumping ground. The subject will be taken up again at a meeting on Friday when it is expected that an ordinance will be presented covering it.

The situation as to the Strahorn bonds was explained to the council. City Attorney De Armond pointing out the legal features of the Strahorn case and their application to the bond situation. On motion of Councilman McKay a committee was appointed by the mayor to consult with lending houses and arrange for a new amendment to the city charter under which bonds might be properly issued.

An ordinance was passed providing for the licensing and regulation of top boys working on the streets. The new building ordinances will be considered at Friday's meeting.

According to the treasurer's report registered city warrants now outstanding amount to \$5,827.62. Other general fund warrants amounting to \$568.39 were ordered paid. March bills were ordered paid in registered warrants as follows:

ably took second place in point of importance on the evening's program. Vernon A. Forbes of Bend struck the pitch note in this particular regard when he said:

"If there is any one thing that Central Oregon needs it is co-operation among its citizens. What is good or bad for Prineville, what is good or bad for Redmond or for Bend is good or bad for all and for Central Oregon. We have the Oregon-California land grant matter pending decision before congress. This matter is vitally important to Central Oregon, because it appears that a large part of this land will be diverted in channels to be utilized for reclamation of arid lands. Oregon has produced more toward the reclamation fund than any other state with the exception of North Dakota and has received less in return. Just such a proceeding as this will do much in calling to the attention of national representatives the need of a state which has done so much toward the accumulation of the fund. We must direct our efforts in such channels as will bring funds to this state for irrigation."

Should Aid the Farmer.
The farmer came in for his quota in the speeches. Percy Davis of Sisters said:

"It is the homesteader with whom I would like to talk. Build up the country by getting in more stock. Twenty to 25 head of thoroughbred stock on an average farm will do much to make the non-producer on a small tract a producer. The people ought to assist the farmer in getting this stock."

"If anything was built by the co-operation of the people, it was the Tumalo project," said Fred N. Wallace, of Tumalo. "The project since it was built has been the object of widespread criticism, but the difficulties which have arisen with regard to construction could not have been averted even with the most intelligent engineering and construction. We are rapidly meeting the leakage difficulties which have been caused by faults in the strata and this year with the waters of Crater Creek diverted for our use we will be able to accommodate at least 5,000 acres with sufficient water. We are anxious for you to know the difficulties as they have existed so that you may be able to meet the opposition which has come up in regard to the Tumalo project."

"It is evident here," said H. H. De Armond of Bend that we are outgrowing smaller ideas. In no section of the northwest have been a greater field for the exercise of their united energies. Bigger things can be started through the energies of bigger men and when this unity of purpose becomes the dominant idea of these men nothing can stop a sure and rapid development."

Towns Boost Each Other.
Reciprocity in boosting was touched upon at length by M. E. Brink of Prineville who urged that each of the Central Oregon towns boost for each others good. Protection for the Central Oregon producer was suggested by George S. Russell, the well known stock man from near Prineville. Standardization of roads was urged by H. J. Overturf of Bend. Unbuilding of automobile roads was the subject of a short talk by Jay H. Upton of Prineville. Other men who spoke briefly upon topics of importance to Central Oregon were: James A. Eastes, Bend; T. E. J. Duffy, Prineville; Judson G. Springer, Prineville; John Dennis, Sisters; Willard Wertz, Prineville; E. M. Lara, Bend; Dr. J. H. Rosenburg, Redmond; M. A. Lynch, Redmond; R. P. Minter, Bend; W. D. Barnes, Tumalo; Rev. Van Hise, Prineville; A. E. Lovett, D. G. Burdickdek, and G. E. Dodson of Red-

mond. Dr. Hesch of Redmond was toastmaster.

Prineville will be the host to the next joint meeting of the three commercial bodies which will be held within the next month, the date to be set in the near future.
