

SHIP FREIGHT THROUGH BEND

INTERIOR CONCERNS TAKE ACTION

Chewaucaus Mercantile Company Will Have Portland As Buying Point Instead of San Francisco, and Bend as Distributing Center.

More than 200 tons of freight, most of which will be used by the Chewaucaus Mercantile Company, of Paisley, will be routed this year from Portland via Bend, instead of San Francisco via Lakeview. This is the first indication that Bend will become Central Oregon's biggest distribution point since the announcement by Lang & Co. of its intention to erect a warehouse at Bend and the investigation for a similar undertaking by Allen & Lewis of Portland.

Believing that Bend will eventually be the distributing point for the entire interior of Central Oregon, merchants are beginning early to look to Portland as their wholesale center and Bend as the distribution center. This is the opinion that has come indirectly from one of the biggest merchants in south central Oregon.

Big Shipments Made.

Last year, it is understood, the Chewaucaus Mercantile Company alone shipped more than 320,000 pounds of freight into Paisley from San Francisco via Lakeview. This freight has been veered to Portland via Bend. The Chewaucaus Mercantile Company will soon purchase automobile trucks for their own conveyance of freight, and will also be assisted in the work by local trucks.

A. C. Egan, local agent for the O. W. R. & N. who was in Paisley, Lakeview and other towns south of Bend last week says that the merchants in the vicinity are beginning to look to Oregon wholesale centers for better prices, better facilities and better rates than they have ever been able to obtain from California points. He says that the merchants of that part of the state are enthusiastic over Bend's promise of becoming Central Oregon's most extensive distributing center. This, he also says, will be invaluable to them in their business and will mean vastly increased business for Bend.

Towns are Optimistic.

This looking northward in the wholesale business is not confined to the large Paisley house, but is also noticeable among the retail men all through the southern part of Central Oregon.

Confidence is everywhere seen in the towns regarding the early announcement of the definite plans of Robert E. Streshen for the construction of the trunk line through south Central Oregon from Bend.

Business in the southern towns is reported to be unusually good; crops so far are better looking than the average. The stockmen have had a favorable year despite the unexpected cold winter and nothing, according to Mr. Egan, seems to be in the way for a bumper year for farmer and business man in the interior towns.
