### BREWSTER LOSES SUIT

Supreme Court Decides Against Former Water Master.

(Crook County Journal.)

A decision was handed down by the Supreme Court Tuesday in the case brought by George H. Brewster against Crook county for salary as water master, in which the county has prevailed in the litigation. The case has been a famous one. Mr. Brewster winning in the circuit court and the county asking the appeal and finally prevailing against Mr. Brewster.

The case was reversed in the supreme court and dismissed without prejudice according to a wire received by District Attorney Wirtz Tuesday, which, in his opinion means that the supreme court has decided that mandamus cannot be employed to compel the county court to audit and allow the water master's salary but that an action at law against the county is the proper procedure to be adopted.
