

BAPTISTS WILL HOLD MEETING

SESSIONS TO OPEN TOMORROW

President speakers in church and missionary work will address convention which will last until Saturday night—40 expected.

The annual convention of the District Baptist Association will be held in Bend beginning tomorrow morning and lasting until Saturday evening in the Baptist church. About 40 delegates and visitors in the district will be present.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE IS PROFFERED

OFFER TO LEASE NEW RAIL LINE

Want 50 Year Contract and Will Give City Two Thirds of Net Earnings—City Plans Now to Sell the Bonds Recently Voted for Railroad.

PRINEVILLE, April 14.—(Special.)—Local capitalists have offered to build the connecting link from Prineville to the main line of the Oregon Traction, operating the line under a lease for 50 years that will give the city two thirds of the net earnings. It now remains for the council to sell 1100 000 of municipal bonds and enter into a contract with these men for the construction of the railroad.

The company agrees to furnish a satisfactory bond that will guarantee the construction of the road according to specifications to be approved by the city. It also offers to take an option on the road when completed for 1100000 the life of said option to be 10 years.

ALL NOW LOOK TO PRIMARIES

publican candidate whose name will be printed on the ballot.

With ten delegates to the Republican National convention to elect four from the state at large and two from each of the three Congressional districts, 29 candidates are listed. There are 12 running in the state at large, four in the first district, three in the second district and nine in the third.

The Democrats must elect an equal number of delegates to the St. Louis convention. Eight are aspirants in the state at large, three in the first district, five in the second and four in the third.

Progressives Name Five.

The Progressives, who are supposed to send five delegates to the National convention, two from the state at large and one from each Congressional district, have just the required number of candidates.

Oregon is entitled to send five electors of president and vice president, and running for their respective party nominations at the coming primaries are seven Republicans, five Democrats and five Progressives.

Neither W. C. Hawley in the first district, nor N. J. Sinnott in the second district, have any opposition in the primaries or general election for Republican or general election for Republican in Congress. In the third district, comprising Multnomah county, however, C. N. McArthur, incumbent; E. V. Littlefield and A. W. Lafferty will vie on the Republican primary ballot for nomination. The winner will compete with John A. Jeffrey, Democrat. Mr. Jeffrey has no opposition in the primaries.

With no candidate for Democratic nomination for Secretary of State,

the race between Ben W. Olcott, incumbent and Charles B. Moores, for the Republican nomination promises to be one of the interesting features of the campaign. There were no other filings for this office today.

For the Republican nomination for Justice of the Supreme Court, Frank A. Moore, present Chief Justice, and George H. Burnett, Associate Justice, have no competition, either in the primaries or the November election.

Woodrow Wilson's name will stand alone on the Democratic primary ballot as a candidate for nomination for president, but the vice presidential nominees, Thomas R. Marshall and Elliott W. Major, of Missouri, will vie for preference.

John D. McMickle, present dairy and food commissioner, has no opposition for the Republican nomination nor in the general election.

The Republican primary ticket will contain the names of six candidates for Public Service Commission in the Eastern Oregon district. The winner will receive the appointment of the place on the commission made vacant by the resignation of Clyde B. Aftchison, according to Governor Withycombe.
