

TWELVE WILL FAVOR HUGHES

MANY DELEGATES DECLARE THEMSELVES

Five Who Would Go to Chicago Convention Favor Roosevelt—Three Candidates in Field From This District—One From Prineville

SALEM, APRIL 25.—Despite the fact that Justice Charles E. Hughes is not an avowed candidate for the Republican nomination for president of the United States, 12 of the 30 candidates for delegate to the national Republican convention have declared for him in their campaign slogan. Five have declared for president Roosevelt; five for the nominee of the primaries; six are non-committal; one says he favors the "Republican's choice;" and one has no campaign slogan.

Below are listed the candidates for delegate from this, the second congressional district, with their slogans as they will appear on the ballot:

W. H. Brooks, of Malheur county—"Let us nominate a man the people will elect."

J. N. Burgess of Umatilla county—"For president, Hughes, if available; otherwise a man of like character."

Charles O. Pollard of Crook county—"Progressive Republican platform; will support in convention, Oregon voter's choice at primaries."

The following are candidates from the state at large:

Charles W. Ackerson, of Multnomah county—"Roosevelt, reunion and results."

Daniel Boyd of Walla Walla county—"Favor Hughes and Borah, will vote and work for Oregon Republican's choice."

Mrs. G. L. Buland, of Multnomah county—"Support primary majority; promotion of Western interests and ideals; conservation of people's welfare."

George J. Cameron of Multnomah—"Personally I am for Hughes; will

support the people's choice for president."

Charles H. Carey of Multnomah county—"Will support Republican presidential candidates chosen by people's vote at the primary."

F. H. Case, of Benton county—"Roosevelt for president."

C. W. Fulton of Multnomah county—"For Hughes for president."

Russell Hawkins, of Tillamook county—"I shall vote for Hughes; if you object, don't elect me."

Samuel D. Peterson, of Umatilla county—"National honor; restoration of permanent prosperity; party harmony."

Leslie M. Scott, of Multnomah county—"National preparedness; strong foreign policies; business prosperity; Republican unity."

Arthur C. Spencer of Multnomah county—"Opposed to time lock convention methods; will faithfully support the people's nominees."

Frank M. Warren, of Multnomah county.

J. H. Worsley, of Multnomah county—"Republican victory means prosperity; Democratic victory means continuance of present conditions."

SMITH SAYS IT IS IMPORTANT THAT FORBES BE RETURNED

Klamath Falls Man Writes Friends in Crescent Urging Importance of Re-election of Bend Representative

That W. O. Smith, joint representative from this district at the last legislature believes that V. A. Forbes should be returned to the legislature this year is indicated by a recent letter written by him to a friend in Crescent and printed in the Crescent News.

The letter follows: "The News desires to be neutral in politics and has always maintained that position. However, we believe that a man who has filled a public position with honor and credit to himself, is worthy of our commendation. We do not believe in trusting our affairs with new and untried men when it is possible to secure the services of those who have proved their worth in laboring in behalf of the state and especially Eastern Oregon. This Vernon A. Forbes did in the last legislature, and we feel that he is too good a man to be put aside at a time when his services are most needed."

"Speaking of Forbes, Wesley O. Smith, of Klamath Falls, says in a letter to Judge F. M. Cleaves, of Crescent:

"I sat beside Forbes for two sessions of the Legislature and we always worked together for the needs of Eastern Oregon. I found him one of the most influential members and whether I am elected or not, I honestly believe that our district needs Forbes at Salem next session. I don't know anything about the other man, but I do know Forbes. Besides a man has to have some experience in a body of that kind in order to be able to secure any recognition. When you figure that the entire eastern part of the state has only 13 members in the House against 47 from western Oregon, these 13 must be the strongest men we can find if we get anything at all over there."

"In the above Mr. Smith voices the sentiment of all the voters of this district. If we expect to get help from the state for our irrigation projects, our drainage projects and our state highways, we must send to the legislature to represent us, men with experience—men who have been and will be recognized—the strongest men we can get."
