

PRINEVILLE IS SUNDAY VICTOR

FIFTH INNING ERRORS ARE COSTLY

Prineville, Hitless and Scoreless Through the Fourth Inning—Local Nine Blows Up and Lets in Five Runs—Tetherow Pitched.

Just as if a German projectile had exploded in camp, so did the Bend nine blow up in the fifth inning of last Sunday's base ball game against Prineville at Prineville. After sailing through peaceful waters for four innings, playing good heady ball, and holding the county seafarers to no hits and no runs Bend exploded on a slight overthrew error to first base by Tetherow. Then came the vandals interspersed with rare comedy and tragedy. The infield was to blame for the whole performance. After Tetherow's error, Horton came along and booted a fast one at shortstop, O'Donnell, with a bad hand and Tetherow let in two runs by dropping the ball at the plate. Miller, on third, was caught napping and let in another. Through the whole affair, Prineville, who had been held at bay put over five runs.

Bend Was Unprepared.

Unprepared, is what the fans say about the Bend team in last Sunday's game. Although four innings went on smoothly and the Prineville nine looked as if it were sacked in the initial attack, Bend, without team work and practice, after the first blow up, was unable to draw together sufficiently to win.

Tetherow pitched ball in his customary form. Up to the end of the fourth inning the Prinevillians were helpless to hit. But from the fifth inning, costly errors and poor fielding gave Prineville five hits. Eight batters were fanned by Tetherow, while Burden, erstwhile of the Multnomah Athletic Club, of Portland, fanned only five men.

Horton, of Bend, lead the Bend column in hitting, getting a single, a two bagger and a three bagger out of four times at the bat.

Bend will meet Prineville on the local grounds next Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Tetherow will pitch for Bend.

erable extent. Clearing, grubbing and perhaps some grading will be by contract, and calls for bids will be issued immediately following the formal approval by the county court.

That the creation of this stretch of highway, in place of what has always been one of the worst bits of roads to the north and south Central Oregon route, will do much to encourage through travel is the opinion of officials here familiar with the territory and conditions. All the Advisory Board, comprising J. H. Albert of Salem, S. Benson of Portland and Leslie Butler of Hood River, have enthusiastically backed the project from the first.

throughout and water pipe laid through the yard for fire protection, 26 hydrants being placed around the mill and yard near the buildings. The company now has 7,000 feet of hose. The couplings are the same as those on the city fire hose.

The Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co. and allied interests control 32,000 acres of timber land lying south and east of Bend which are estimated to be sufficient to supply the mill for 20 years running one shift a day. For the time being only one shift will be used but a night crew may be put on later.

The Personnel.

The business of the company is in the hands of J. P. Keyes, general manager. Mr. Keyes has been associated with the Brooks-Scanlon interests for a number of years having his first position with Brooks Brothers, at their retail yards in St. Paul. Later he was connected with the company's Scanlon, Minnesota, plant, going from there to Powell River, B. C., where he built the large pulp and paper mill of The Powell River Co. Mr. Keyes came to Bend from Powell River in 1912 to take charge of the saw mill of The Bend Company, in which the Brooks-Scanlon interests owned one third, going to his present position when work on the new plant was begun last fall.

Harry S. Brooks, a son of Dr. D. F. Brooks, is the resident director of the company, which is a Minnesota corporation, and will have charge of sales. Mr. Brooks came to Bend from Powell River last summer.

Many of the men in charge of different departments have been with the Brooks-Scanlon interests in the past. These include Sam Blakely, who is the logging superintendent, John Eng, the yard superintendent and George Gove mill superintendent. Mr. Blakely and Mr. Eng were company employees at Scanlon, and Mr. Gove had charge of The Bend Company mill.

J. C. Richter will be the planing mill and box factory superintendent. The boarding houses in the woods and at the mill are run by Frank W. Sullivan.
