

PRINEVILLE IS WALLOPED 5-4

GAME GOES TO AN EXTRA INNING

Visitors Held Without Hits or Runs Until the Eighth, When Explosion Nearly Loses The Game—Score Tied in Ninth—Fans Excited.

Any bald headed freckle fan would have had tonic enough for a week if he had been at the matinee performance last Sunday afternoon when Bend sent the Jinx sulking into the bushes. It took a clean two bagger by Horton in the 10th and a much needed right field single by Tetherow to give Bend the game 5 to 4.

It was just like yachting for Bend up to the eighth. Bend had four scores put away in brine by the end of the fourth inning and was holding the visitors in a trance with no hits and no runs. But Prineville came out from under the influence of Bend anaesthetic when O'Donnell dropped a hard one at the plate on Miller's third strike. Bechtell came up and was sent to the first sack on a hit by pitched ball. Bowman went to first on a fielder's choice and Miller stole third and came in on Bowman's sacrifice. Estes got a clean hit to left field, scoring Bechtell. Then in the ninth inning, with Bend still two scores to the good, Morris came up and got a clean single. After a series of fumbles at the plate, almost a duplication of the affair at Prineville last Sunday, Morris and Burden scored. That tied the score.

Bend Scores in First.
Now to drop back a few innings, that is, to begin at the beginning. Horton came up in the first inning and hit a fat one to Estes at short who plowed around in the volcanic ash and lost the ball. Tetherow went first on a fielder's choice, putting Horton on third. Tetherow went to second on an overthrow. Stover hit a clean one to right field, scoring Horton. O'Donnell hit a fly to center field which Tetherow beat to the plate. Bend did not score again until the fourth inning. Stover came to bat and walked, went to second on a wild pitch and third on O'Donnell's single. O'Donnell stole second and went to third on a wild pitch by Clark.

Stover scored on Clark's wild pitch and O'Donnell scored on Clow's high fly to left field. Score at the end of the fourth was 4 to 0, and so it was, until the eighth inning resurrection of Prineville.

Again to the game at the end of the ninth with the score tied. Clow was first up and flew to Estes. Johnson went out, Bechtell to Morris and Reed, Miller to Clark. No score in the last of the ninth for Bend. Prineville came up and Bowman went out. Tetherow to Steidl. Estes for the second time hit a clean single and got on third. With one down and one on third, Tetherow pulled together and struck out Ellis and Morris. Steidl was the first man up in the last of the tenth for Bend and went out at first. Horton, who already had a two bagger and a single marked up to his credit, stepped to the plate and whanged the first ball away out to the left field bushes for a two bagger. Tetherow came up and hit an easy one on the third base line that ought to have been called a fair ball, but passed as a foul. Fortunately for Bend that it did go as a foul, for the next ball pitched resulted in a clean drive to right field which scored Horton, winning the game.

Tetherow a Puzzle.
Tetherow was working well throughout the game, even when odds were breaking against him in the eighth and ninth innings. The splitter he has a lease on is, according to O'Donnell, a terror to handle. That is what caused most of the trouble at the plate. Up until the eighth inning the visitors were in the dark. In all the Cline Falls farmer faked 13 men and allowed only three little stinky hits.

Horton batted .600 Sunday. Out of five times up he got two two baggers and a single. Hits all around for Bend were timely.

Clark, who twirled for Prineville, said to be an imported article come from Lakeview, was found for nine hits and fanned only six men. He is a southpaw and has a slow in curve that gave some of the Bend hitters a little trouble in making the necessary connections.

Horton is wearing a black and blue honor mark around the left eye. He displayed good headwork when a bad bound connected with his left optic, i. e., he stopped the ball.

The Bend infield gave Tetherow about as much talking support as an aggregation of somnambulists.

Prineville fought the game to a standstill until Tetherow put Horton across the plate in the last of the tenth inning.

The biggest crowd that ever saw a base ball game was out Sunday and basked in the sunshine.

Clark, who twirled for Prineville, is one of the hyphenated varieties. He is from Lakeview.

There was a chance for some diplomatic discussion of Tetherow's single to right field in the last of the tenth inning. The ball fell behind the right field crowd and even the umpire couldn't see whether it was caught.

Tetherow was working the slippery elm overtime on his splitters and had O'Donnell worried many times in plinches.

Estes, the Crook county high school lad, got two of Prineville's three hits, and also is credited with two errors in his position.

Anyway the next game will be played in the new ball park.

AFTER NORTH UNIT.

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BEND VOTERS IN BIG MAJORITY

REGISTRATION TOTALS OF INTEREST HERE

Town Has Third of County Vote—Will Poll as Many Votes as Redmond and Prineville Together—Republicans Have Big Lead.

(Crook County Journal.)

There are only about 3336 voters registered for the primaries which will be held next month. The exact figure is not available because of the heavy volume of work that is being cared for in the office of the county clerk at this time, but unofficially the number is a few less than the figure mentioned above.

Approximately 2200 of the number are republicans, and 1050 are democrats, while more than 100 people registered as the members of the smaller parties.

At least two thirds of the voters are men, the ratio being nearer even in the towns than in the country districts. Registration of feminine population of Bend was very light however.

More voters receive their mail at Bend than any other point. The registration gives 1073 for Bend, 752 for Prineville, 357 for Redmond and the remainder of the county but 859, which means that more voters reside in or near Bend than in all the remainder of the county combined, excepting the other two towns mentioned, also that Bend will poll as many votes as both Prineville and Redmond combined, or about one third of the total vote.

At Prineville there are 432 republicans, 306 democrats and 22 miscellaneous, 496 of the number being men and 274 women voters.
