Town Has Third of County Vote-Will Poll as Many Votes as Redmond and Prineville Together-Republicans Have Big Lead.

At least two thirds of the voters are men, the ratio being nearer even in the towns than in the country population of Bend was very light however.

More voters receive their mail at Bend than any other point. The registration gives 1073 for Bend, 752 for Prineville, 357 for Redmond and the remainder of the county but 869, which means that more voters reside in or near Bend that in all the remainder of the county combined excepting the other two towns men-tioned, also that Bend will poll as many votes as both Prineville and Redmond combined, or about one third of the total vote.

At Prineville there are 432 repub licans, 306 democrats and 32 miscel-laneous, 496 of the number being being men and 274 women voters
