BEND DEFEATS CULVER 10 TO 3

HIGH SCHOOL LOSES TO LA PINE.

Prineville Walks Over Shevlin-Hixon 21 to 1—The Dalles May Play Here Sunday—Monty O'Donnell Buys New Ball Park Grounds.

Bend's victory over Culver by a score of 10 to 3 last Sunday at Culver would give the impression that the local nine had a complete walk away, but reports on the game are to the effect that the Culverites put up a stiff game, with the exception of the sixth and eighth innings. Up to the fifth inning Culver held Bend to two runs while Culver had put over three scores.

In the fifth inning Boring, the Culver pitcher, weakened and allowed three hits and a walk which netted three scores. Boring was taken out and Barnes went into the box in the eighth inning and was found for six hits which gave Bend four additional scores. Boring, who has a fast ball, gave the Bend hitters, with the exception of O'Donnell, considerable trouble. He struck out 10 men in the seven innings he was in the box, and allowed only six hits.

Springer opened the game for Bend but was taken out in the end of the second and replaced by Tetherow. Culver scored two runs on Springer and three hits. Tetherow allowed three hits.

O'Donnell was the hitting demon for Bend last Sunday getting a three bagger, a two bagger and two singles.

MARKET REPORT.

NORTH PORTLAND, May 8.—

The cattle market opened rather brisk, although the receipts were light. One shipment of pulp fed steers sold at \$9.15, this being the top price. Bulk of grain fed stock sold at \$8.85 to \$9. No change in prices of cows, heifers or bulls, receipts being very light. There was a slight decrease in calf receipts this week, although the prices were unchanged. A fair run of hogs was received. The bulk sold at prices ranging from \$9 to \$9.15. The top prices reached being \$9.20 and \$9.25. Market closing strong. The sheep receipts are showing a marked increase. Spring lambs are bringing \$10 to \$10.50. No change in prices of wethers and ewes. This class of stock is still in great demand.
